Hurray for the "Bears" and the "Reds". St. Lawrence won out too. Lots of Irish on the editor's New York squad - - you know.

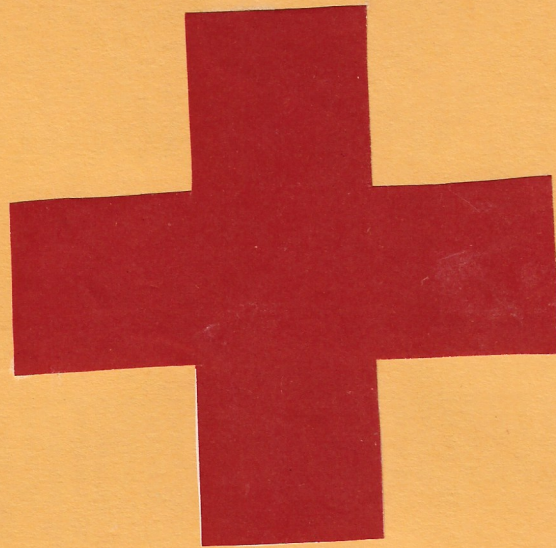
