

The mission of the Kiwanis Family House is "dedicated to providing temporary housing and support to families of seriously ill children being treated at the University of California at Davis Medical Center" The KFH officially opened with 6 rooms in 1984 and in 1990 expanded to 14 rooms. There is a charge of \$15 per night per family. However many families pay nothing. A new KFH is being planned with 32 bedrooms, private bathrooms, fully equipped kitchens, common areas and play areas.

Report of the Official Minutes of November 14,2002 Board Meeting

President Nancy Curnow convened the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. in the Healdsburg Police Department. The following officers were present: President Nancy Curnow; Vice President Jerry Strong; Second Vice President Dan Maraviglia; Secretary Neil Iversen; Administrative Treasurer Dennis Gary and Past President Tim Tuscany. Board members: Jim Birdsong, Fred Haley, Rich Iverson, Todd Brandt, John Dayton and Steve Metrulas. Visiting was Dennis Stead, Key Club Advisor.

MINUTES: Rich Iverson moved we accept the minutes of October 10, Fred Haley seconded the motion and it passed.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: BILLS: All bills were paid for October at the November 12 meeting. DUES: From October 10 to November 14 we collected \$3,097 (21 active, 6 seniors and 2 admittance fees). COMMUNICATIONS: (A) Robert S. Ward running for Governor Elect for the Cal-Nev-Ha District for 2003-2004. (B) Kiwanis International looking for club donations to support Kiwanis Family Sponsored programs and to serve the youth during the holiday season. (Suggest \$5 per member; with 74 members @ \$5 equals \$370. Tabled until the December 12 board meeting. OTHER: Kiwanis International has a plan similar to the Cal-Nev-Ha "AIMS" award. So will continue it for this coming year to encourage members to earn this "AIMS" award. The board accepted the secretary's report.

TREASURERS' REPORTS: Dennis Gary reported on the Administrative fund and the Project fund. Jerry Strong moved we accept the reports, Steve Metrulas seconded the motion and it passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Fred Corson is involved with the Dry Creek Association board meetings on the same night so he can't attend our board meetings. He will see if the Dry Creek Board can change that board meeting to another evening.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: (A) DUES: President Nancy Curnow went over the list of members in arrears in dues. The secretary looked the list over and found 11 of the 34 had paid since her list had been printed, therefore totaling only 23 unpaid as of November 14. Dennis Stead said he would talk to Martin Edwards, as he has a new job now and may be attending more meetings. Tim Tuscany said he would talk to Vern Losh.

NEW BUSINESS: (A). DUES: The board talked over raising the club dues. Administrative Treasurer Dennis Gary said he totaled up the monthly bills and

(E) 80th Anniversary: President Nancy announced that next November 3, 2003 our club will be 80 years old and we had better get started on planning. Dennis Stead volunteered to be chairman. Others present said they would help. (F) Tree Lighting: VNA / Home Hospice Christmas Tree Lighting ceremony on December 1 in the Plaza reported by Richard Iverson and they wanted Kiwanis to set up card tables and take part as in past vears. Richard had a sign up sheet. (G) Leave of Absence: Richard Nair asking for a 6 months leave of absence commencing mid-October through March. Secretary Neil Iversen moved we accept his leave of absence, Jerry Strong seconded the motion and it passed (at the club meeting of November 19,2002)
