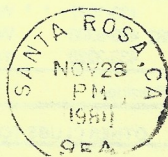

Next months bulletins will be done by Lindsay "Juke Box" Wurlitzer.

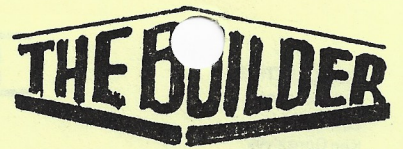
