What Is The Criteria Used To Determine a Distinguished Club?

Do you know the criteria that are used to establish if the club is a Distinguished Club? Well, I had never seen this information till in October. I hope this is useful to you.

1. Net membership gain 3%. Started with 78

members, need to gain 3 members by year end.

2. Completed and reported on significant service projects in each standing committee: Community Services, Human and Spiritual Values, and Youth Services.

3. Club ensures Key Club fulfills its annual responsibilities and submitted all required reports.

4. Club must also contribute at least \$1.00 per member to Kiwanis International Foundation and \$1.00 per member to Cal-Nev-Ha Foundation.

There are five basic administrative criteria that the club must meet. We have such an excellent distinguished secretary . He always takes care of business and meets the criteria, so I won't even state theme here.

Must meet three of the following:

1. Representative to International Convention.

2. Representative by president or designate, and at least one other member, to the district convention.

3. Club will be represented by at least four Members to the official Governor's visit.

4. The president and club secretary or their designees will represent the club at no less than 75% of the Lt. Governor's Division Council meetings.

5. The Club sponsors a new Kiwanis Club during

the administrative year.

6. The club will have completed a community analysis and a club analysis.

President Tim Tuscany convened the board meeting at 7:10 p.m. at the Healdsburg Police Department at which time a quorum was present.

The following officers were present: President Tim Tuscany, 1st V.P. Nancy Curnow, Secretary Neil Iversen. Board members: Fred Haley, Dee Whitehall, Rich Iverson,

Yolanda Rinaldo, Dan Maraviglia and Ernie Ralston.

President Tim said that board member Dennis Stead was present at the November 8th board meeting, for correction. Yolanda Rinaldo moved the minutes of November 8 be approved as corrected. Rich Iverson seconded the motion and it passed.

BILLS: All bills paid by the Administrative Treasurer pertaining to that fund. In project fund, reference Fitch Mountain School Book Case Project: Garrett Hardware, % Alvin Dordahl, \$32.79; Healdsburg Lumber, with 10% discount % Jim Lucchesi, \$217. (JL Builders), Total for project, \$249.79, just under our planned budget of \$250.

DUES: from November 9 to December 8, \$525 was collected from 4 active and 2 active partial payments. During this first quarter Oct.-Dec., 2001 we have 14 active and one

CORRESPONDENCE: Patrick Barnes, 4th Grade teacher at Healdsburg Elementary School returned our March check of \$250 to send students to the R-Ranch Summer Camp for Boys and Girls since they did not attend because of no vimming pool. Other announcements: Petaluma Oyster Feed Tuesday, February 26; Cloverdale Kiwanis planning a Pancake Breakfast on Mother's Day, May 12. Secretary advised Nancy Curnow to have our Palm Sunday Pancake Breakfast tickets printed in January so we can sell tickets in February and March. Palm Sunday is March 24, 2002. By paying now, before December 31,2001 we can rent the Villa Chanticleer at the old rate of \$653

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Yolanda Rinaldo reported on visiting with the Becoming Independent group who advised that Healdsburg badly needs restrooms for the handicapped and asked for \$5000 from Kiwanis in support. The board is ready to pledge \$1,000 but will ask the group to seek additional support. Yolanda said she would check with Dan Gianni to see if the group has sought other funding. No further action was taken at this time.

PROJECTS: Yolanda Rinaldo and Rick Iverson spoke of planning to plant a Health Garden at the north end of the Healdsburg General Hospital and have the city's architect lay out the plans and design it for us. The board thought it was a fine idea and suggested working with the Healdsburg Beautification Committee. Dan Maraviglia moved that a warrant be drawn in the sum of \$100 to be used to lay out the est bank of the Health Garden. Fred Haley seconded the otion and it was approved.

KENNELS: Yolanda Rinaldo reported that she was looking into the Healdsburg Animal Shelter repairs as a project. She advised it was going to be a big job since there is a need for much masonry work.

GIFTS: Nancy Curnow, progran chair for the December 18 Christmas party, asked that the club give our two waitresses each \$100 for Christmas. Yolanda Rinaldo so moved we pay the ladies \$100 each. Fred Haley seconded the

motion and it was approved.

NEW BUSINESS: Membership in the Chamber of Commerce was renewed at \$75 with President Tim Tuscany as our representative. The Healdsburg High School Boys Basketball program asked for funding support for uniforms, first aid kits and basketballs, as the school funding will not pay for these items in this school year. Dan Maraviglia moved that we donate \$175 to the HHS Boys Basketball program, Rich Iverson seconded the motion and it passed.

RESIGNATION: Michael Villa submitted resignation from the Kiwanis Club due to the press of business and family commitments. Fred Haley moved we accept Michael's resignation, Dan Maraviglia seconded the motion

and it was approved.

H.E.L.P. A donation of \$250 to the Healdsburg Educational Legacy Partnership whose goal is to educate every child in the Healdsburg-Alexander Valley area was

approved

DISTRICT BUSINESS: A Cal-Nev-Ha bulletin asking for donations toward funding a state-of-the-art magazine format for the 2001-2002 magazine was presented. Fund Raising Committee Will Meet To Discuss Ideas For New Projects



Key Clubbers Are Making Plans for the Annual Kiwanis Club Bake Sale


