

KEY CLUB FIFTY YEARS OLD THIS YEAR:

The first Key Club was sponsored in May, 1925, in the Sacramento High School by the Sacramento Kiwanis Club. It was first organized as a club to study vocations with Kiwanians supplying the speakers each week. It later became a school service club. The idea soon spread to other Kiwanis Clubs and by 1945 the Key Club International Constitution was adopted at a meeting in New Orleans. The real reason for Key Clubs is to serve the school, fellow students and the community.

The Healdsburg High School Key Club was started in 1948. The man most responsible for its creation was Byron Gibbs, -- when he was Lieut. Gov. of Division 8. The first faculty advisor was Art McCaffrey. Bill Stiles is faculty advisor, at the present time.

All Kiwanians are asked to be thinking of possible speakers or other programs we might have for future meetings. We all have the responsibility of being program chairman for the day and providing a program. Let Roger Christenson know of possible programs we might have.


