April Board of Directors Meeting

Administration Management

• With an influx of dues, the Admin account is now over \$5,000.

• The Foundation checking account contains \$97,491. The Children's Fund is composed of \$7,025 of restricted endowment funds, \$5,070 for the Jordan Strong Memorial, \$32,387 from the Fall Matching Funds event.

Grants/Donations/Requests

Prune Packer's - \$2,500. Dick presented the request from the Prune Packers, who are creating a video production program for their summer baseball games in collaboration with HHS Career Technical Department's Video Production students under the direction of John Chevalier, the Audio/Video Production teacher. Equipment for this project is expected to cost \$12,000. The Kiwanis grant funds 3 high end video cameras.

The Prune Packers want to provide opportunities to our HHS students that will allow them to pursue rewarding careers that strengthen their lives, our community and the economy.

Tuesday Zoom Meetings

Apr 6 - Felicia Smith, Healdsburg Utility Analyst

We need to prepare for the impacts of drought conditions. So far this year, Sonoma County has received only 35 percent of typical rainfall



and Lake Mendocino, which supplements Healdsburg's drinking water, is 45.4 percent of its target storage.

Felicia presented some useful information on what water use restrictions can be expected and ways to save water.

Healdsburg and Sonoma County will move to mandatory measures in the upcoming weeks in order to sustain our drinking water supply. The following measures can be expected:

- Restricted irrigation schedules.
- Restricted water uses such as pools and car washing.
- Expanded and improved conservation incentives.

Ways to save outdoors:

- Remove lawns. Install drought tolerant plants.
- Water between 12am and 6am to reduce evaporation and improve retention,
- Inspect and tune-up irrigation system.
- Use a broom, not a hose.
- Cover pools and hot tubs.

Ways to save indoors:

- Find and fix leaks.
- Replace old toilets.
- Yellow Mello.
- Install faucet aerators and low flow shower
 heads
- Upgrade to front loader clothes washer and/or run with a full load.

Ways to save – advanced:

- Use a bucket to capture cold shower water.
- Install a recirculation pump in bathroom sinks.
- Install a grey water laundry to landscaping system

Install rainwater capture systems (for next year)

Ways to save \$\$\$

Healdsburg's Utility Department offers rebates for water conservation measures:

- \$1 per square foot for lawn removal.
- \$150 for a front loader clothes washer.
- \$110 for toilet replacement
- \$100 for irrigation improvements and smart irrigation controllers.

Reduced water use will result in on-bill savings for water use and sewer fees.

Apr 20 – Kevin Burke, Healdsburg Police Chief

Chief Burke spoke about his career in law enforcement and the current political and social climate surrounding policing.



The formative part of Chief Burk's career was with the

Los Angeles Police Department where he experienced the Rodney King Riots as a young police officer. After 20 years in LA, he was feeling the milage and found a very different environment in Healdsburg.

He contrasted the Rodney King Riot with the current George Floyd Protests. Although Rodney King did not die, and George Floyd did, the earlier riot was very intense and chaotic for an extended period of time. Whether or not there was a use of force on Rodney King was debatable. No video.

The George Floyd situation was more focused, intense for a relatively short time and then over. The protesters were much more main-stream and had broad support. Chief Burk's visit was on the day of the Floyd verdict, but before it was known. He stated that he believed there is no question of guilt.

The Chief discussed coming and ongoing changes in policing. He suggests that there should be a dedicated social worker on the police department staff to advice police on handling of different situations. The officers should be trained to be conscious of the situation at hand and recognize how to react. Also, the public should be better educated

on services that the police department provides and what they do not and how they can help police do their job.

Diversity of police departments is important, but recruitment is difficult. Police work does not appeal to many women and minorities, reducing the diverse pool of potential officers.

After 11 years with the HPD, the chief is ready to retire and become a normal resident of Healdsburg.
