KIWANIS BULLETIN June 15, 1982

THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM:

Bob Young and Paul McDonald capably reported on the grape growing and the wine marketing industries and their problems. are 700,000 acres in wine grapes in California: \$6 billion invested in vineyards and \$3 billion in wineries. Paul pointed out that there is an additional \$3 billion in wine sales to make a not shabby \$12 billion involved in the industry. Per capita consumption is increasing steadily, now 2.28 gallons of wine per person for the country as a whole. In contrast, 4 plus gallons of wine is consumed per person in California! In the U.S.: California white wine accounts for 41% of the wine sold; rose, 14%; California red, 12%, imported red, 10%; all others, 6%. Imports are increasing rapidly, however, and are affecting domestic wine sales. Also of interest, ten wineries account for 90% of the production. Gallo alone has 37% of the market. There are many publications available on wine and wine-growing and growers are becoming more aware of their responsibility to help the wine industry. The Wine Growers Association, with 600 members is becoming a strong influence in wine marketing, for example. Paul stated his mission is to get our wines to other countries and pointed out that of the world export market of 1.2 billion gallons, our exports amount to only 10.7 million gallons, mostly to Canada. Our per capita consumption is 2 plus gallons per person, while France has a whopping 27 gallons per person, Japan is 20 gallons per person and even Russia consumes 4 gallons per person. Export potential is tremendous and must be exploited

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM:

As part of our on-going major emphasis program, Bill Hayes introduced Lee Sawyer, managing director of the Sonoma County Community Blood Bank, who spoke on the continuing need for blood and blood donors. The Blood Bank is a non-profit organization that is a member of the American Association of Blood Banks, serving Lake, Mendocino, and Sonoma Counties since 1947. The organization includes 16 volunteers. In 1981 they supplied 15,400 units of blood to 17 hospitals in the area, they need a steady supply of donors to fill these requirements. process allows blood to be kept 35 days now instead of the 21 days maximum before. A blood regeneration machine has also been developed that will re-constitue the blood of a bleeding person so that it can be re-introduced into that person's system. These improvements have helped the program greatly, but the need for blood donors remains acute. Dick Swarts, a visitor from the Santa Rosa Downtown Club, and also a part of the program, spoke about giving blood on a regular basis, if you are able, through your Club, Church, or other organization. Remember, you can give up to five units per year.

Frank mentioned some of the recent occurances in the vision field: surgery for nearsightedness, using a cookie cutting technique to remove a portion of the lens, flatten its curvature by cutting and re-implanting to improve myopia. Diagnosis by computer for vision testing. Using infra-red to determine perpheral vision. Laser beams to read lenses and for surgery to improve vision. As we grow older the lens become less flexible and has less transparency, leading to reduced vision and ultimately to cataracts. Lens implants also a new technique. A most interesting discussion, especially to us older folk!
