SUCCESSFUL FUND RAISING

Ever wonder what makes the difference between a successful fund-raiser and one that flops? All too frequently, vast amounts of time and energy yield rather disappointing results. So, before you pour another pancake or crack another crab, let's consider a few tips that could increase your odds of success.

FIRST: Examine the type of event you want to host. Will it generate a lot of response in your community?. What sort of monetary potential does it have? Has it proved financially successful in the past? Compare your projected time money and effort spent with your revenue goal.

SECOND: Gather internal support. There's more strength, energy and money generated by inter-club events. And, make sure to ask everyone who may support your cause to help with your event.

THIRD: Build cross promotion and sponsorship. If you're hosting a dinner-dance you may keep cost down by getting the venue donated. Hotels and restaurants will often cross promote if they're named as the leading sponsor on all printed and advertising material. Offer to put their name on a program or banner. (Get one free by cross promoting with a sign company.) If you generate media attention, you can offer even more bang for their buck by placing their business name in "media" view. Grocery stores may donate other needed items if you offer them similar promotional opportunities

FOURTH: Identify your target audience & your hook of appeal. If your dinner dance features spaghetti as the main course, are there local journalist, or radio and TV personalities that would enjoy competing for charity while showing off their (or someone's) prize winning sauce? Will reps from local businesses pay to join in the competition, or at least sponsor it?. Will community folks pay good money to enjoy this kind of dinner and associated fun?.

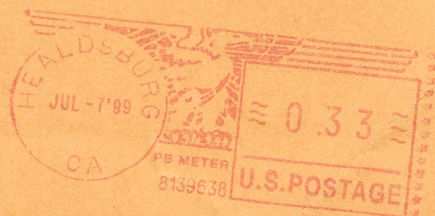

We are a little club in numbers of members, Jose says, but a big one regarding the communities welfare.

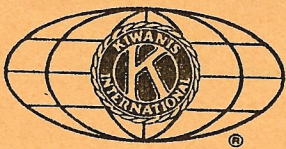
COMEDY CORNER

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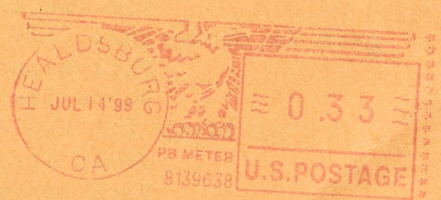

COL. Herc Swaney USMC (ret) related his experiences during WWII on the attack and occupation of Iwo Jima. He described the extensive underground network of shelters including a 220 bed hospital. He also described the effort required to take the island and the many casualties that occurred. Col Swaney was wounded several times and was finally moved out after the island was taken. His battallion experienced 102% casualties. The island is still owned by the Japanese and tours can be conducted. Col swaney does not want to return.

KIWANIS SMOOTH SICK INFANTS

Of the ten to fifteen babies born daily at the Dr. Rrafael S. Tumbukon Memorial Hospital, a public facility in the Aklan province of the Philippines, 10 to 20 percent are premature, underweight, diabetic, jaundiced, or otherwise infected. These sick infants for many years have no specific place to go for treatment, says Kiwanian Guidon I.Dela Cruz. That is until the Kiwanis Club of Kalibo, Philippines, stepped in to create the Neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at the hospital. Through various fund-raising projects, the club was able to provide the unit's flooring, painting, glass viewing window and door, a washing sink, and plumbing, says Guidon, who is the Kalibo NICU project chairman. Further fund raising is in the works to provide additional features for the NICU, including air conditioning and incubators, bilirubin lights, a suction machine, and a full time nurse. Once the building is complete, the local government will pay for the nurses salary and the electricity used in the unit, and the Kalibo Kiwanettes will donate an infant weighing scale.

After reading the above, I began to wonder why our Healdsburg club couldn't do A FUND RAISER FOR THE FIRE OR POLICE DEPT IN WHICH WE COULD CHAMPION A FUND RAISER TO COVER THE PURCHASE OF SOME EMERGENCY LIFE SAVING EQUIPMENT. We could spearhead a community drive in which we would solicit many of the community clubs in town to help accomplish our goal.
