TODAY'S PROGRAM: Art McCaffrey will introduce Jerry Schroeder, our new Superintendent of the Healdsburg High School District. The club's special guests will be the new teachers aboard for the coming school year. PROGRAM: Orin Bain presented Frank Crossfield, Ranger in charge of Sonoma County for the California Department of Forestry, who subed for Gil Werder. Ranger Crossfield offered a slide presentation on how the CDF fulfills its responsibility of enforcing the forest and fire laws which encompasses one-third of the state's geography. He closed the program with some mind-boggling costs for one phase of firefighting--the use of aerial tankers, incorrectly called "borate bombers"--borate has not been used for at least 15 years. Instead it is phoscheck, a fertilizer type liquefied. He cited some of the costs; e.g., the S-2 tanker costs \$292/day standby or \$558/hr. in action and the D-6, with a 2000 gallon load at \$600/day standby and \$1100/hr. in action plus the cost of the fire retardant. We better mind Smokey the Bear and BE CAREFUL with fire producing materials!
