Wine was known of as long ago as 6,000 B.C. in Persia, 2,000 B.C. in China, and 1,000 B.C. in Egypt. Early European monasteri refined the process. Columbas found wild grapes in America : early Spanish conquerors grafted them and made wine forcad such activities to protect its own industry. Around 1700 the Jesuits began to develop wine making in the Americas again and the early missionaries brought grape growing and wine making to California. The first commercial grower in California operated in Los Angeles in the early 1800's but rapid growth did not come until the 1850's. The first local winery was at the Fountaingrove commune in 1875. Yvonne says that wine-cooking makes good food better and that all one must know is to use the right wine in the right quantity in the right way.



Criginally placed as a basic insurance and pension plan upon which each person could build according to his needs, it has been expanded with disability coverage, with Medicare, and most recently with supplemental income payments which are designed to take care of immediate needs like welfare. Mr Wilson urged us to ask questions of his department rather than of others in order to curb the tremendous amount of mis-information which plagues the program.




