

Steak Dinner, Live and Silent Auctions plus a Celebrity Chef Set For August 28 Fund Raiser

Dennis Stead, chairman of the annual Healdsburg Kiwanis barbcue and auction which raises funds for the administrative fund, promises a "bigger and better" fun night. The event this year has been moved from the usual Tuesday night to a Saturday night so members of other clubs can join us for this special event scheduled for Saturday, August 28 at Brandt's Beach and Picnic Grounds. Festivities will get underway at 6 p.m. with a social hour followed by the barbecue dinner which will feature steak.

The dinner,instead of being catered as in past years, will be prepared by club members and will feature celebrity chef Charlie Palmer, owner of the Dry Creek Kitchen located in the Healdsburg Hotel. Palmer, who lives in Healdsburg with his wife Lisa and four boys, over the years has combined his creative cooking spirit and his business abilities to open thirteen notable restaurants throughout the country, wine shops and boutique hotels. He is a frequent guest on TV shows and has written four cookbooks.

Sponsored by her mother, Susan Young Sheehy, Kelly Ann Sheehy was inducted as an associate member with traditional ceremonies on Tuesday evening, July 27 by membership chairman Rick Norman. She became the club's 15th new member in the 2009-2010 Kiwanis year

Kiwanis New World Wide Project: Eliminate Maternal & Neonatal Tetanus

Spreading the word in our local community about Kiwanis International's new project is the role of Kiwanis clubs world wide.

President Loretta Strong, a delegate to the Kiwanis International convention in Las Vegas, reported to the club that the goal of the project, ELIMINATE, is to do away with maternal and neonatal tetanus on a world wide basis.

She said that the project entails a five year program and that Kiwanis has partnered with UNICEF and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to achieve the goal of eliminating this disease which is killing a child every 6 minutes. There are 40 countries affected by the disease

Maternal and Neonatal Tetanus, an infection contracted by any open wounds during the birth process, can be cured by a simple vaccination that has to be administered three times. The cost is only \$1.80 per child.

ELIMINATE is not the first world wide project sponsored by Kiwanis International. The previous one was conquering iodine deficiency on a world wide level.

Loretta , accompanied by her husband, past president Jerry Strong, came away from the convention with praise and enthusiasm for the speakers and program. She is convinced more than ever of the important place, world wide, that Kiwanis International enjoys.


Steak Dinner and Auction:

Restructure of Club Committees For 2010-2011Approved By Board

A report by the committee comprised of Dan Gianni and Dan Maraviglia to study the structure of the various committees now existing was accepted and approved by the board of directors at the July 22 meeting with some changes recommended.

The committee recommendations will be presented to the full membership at the club's August 3 luncheon meeting.

The committee's recommendations included two sub groups, Standing Committees and Event Committees including the elimination of eight committees. The recommendations stipulated that the president, with the advice of the executive committee, (President, President-Elect and Immediate Past President_would nominatename the members of the Standing Committees and the Chairpersons of the Event Committees.

The changes to the committees will be effective October 1 with two board approved amendments. The changes stipulated that the Program Committee would remain as a Standing Committee and that the Executive Committee (President, President-Elect and Immediate Past President) would nominate all Standing Committee members and Event Committee chairpersons once a year, with the board having a vote on those nominations, and with the Executive Committee authorized make necessary interim to anv appointments.

The board also discussed ways and means of getting new members involved in the committees. Rick Norman, Membership Chairman, will try to ascertain the interests of the new members. The committees and their functions will be presented to the membership especially at the evening meetings. Lunch meeting workshops and speakers to describe the committee functions will be utilized.

In other business, the revision to the by-laws as written by secretary Phil Luks and presented to the board will be presented to the membership at large for adoption effective October 1. The by-laws call for a single vice-president and for one year terms for officers,


The board approved a donation of \$100 to the Art and Anne Weaver scholarship fund which rotates the award of a \$1700 scholarship annually among the Division 32 clubs. Art Weaver was a member of the Santa Rosa Club and served as Lt. Governor a number of times.

The board, at this time, agreed to supply a work force to restore the one room Daniels School in the Venado district and delayed any monetary contributions to a later time. The request was presented by Bonnie

Pitkin who indicated that approximately \$10,000 would be needed for design and permitting effort and \$30,000 to \$40,000 for materials.

Loretta Strong led a discussion on whether to consider corporate membership, allowing a corporation to sponsor a certain number of individuals and to pay an increased dues amount. Membership chairman Rick Norman pointed out that this could be part of a larger marketing campaign. They will follow up with district leaders to obtain more specific ideas.

Loretta Strong reported on several points made at the Kiwanis International convention held in Las Vegas. She noted that an effort to shorten the "six objects of Kiwanis" was voted down, and the board agreed that the existing list still served the club well. She also noted that there was a useful discussion of means to assess the service impact of the project activities and grants each club undertook. A periodic review of those activities could lead the club to change its focus to have a greater community impact. (Secretary Phil Luks Contributed to This Article).



PSST UPDATE: Tania Amochaev of the Public School Success Team gave a progress report to the Kiwanis Club at the July 20 meeting. She reported that the program started in September of 2009 involving the adoption of a fifth grade class was very successful and that a second fifth grade will be adopted starting this school year. However, the program can use more tutors and mentors and urged members to sign up. The program will follow the students through graduation from high school and upon graduation they will have the opportunity of enrolling at Sonoma State University. Kiwanian Lee Gunnerson served as a math tutor last year and termed it a highly invigorating experience. He said "It was lots of fun, you should try it." 
