

Bob Malone presented Walter Eagan, County Supt. of Schools since 1968, who in turn presented Steve Gibson, Ornamental, etc., instructor at Healdsburg Hi-School

Walter talked about the counties involved in regional occupational programs; vocational programs and such. Last year there were 800 students involved in the program. This current year may see it rise to 2,000. Most classes are held on campus. Specialized ones are held on-site or in buildings appropriate to the program. Classes are related to the job market statewide and not just the county. Schoma County has 40 classes located somewhere throughout the area. The courses consist of Auto Body Repair (off campus); Electronics (on campus); Landscaping, Auto-mechanics, etc., (off campus). These are just a few of the occupations in the program.

Steve showed slides of activities in Cloverdale and Sebastopol wherein the on-site classes made gardens and patics for the school and a senior-citizen clubhouse. I will say that the before & after pictures showed what can be done to sore-eyed or bleary-looking areas. The kids did a beautiful job.

There is a .02¢ tax rate being asked for this program on the November Ballot ... Prop. #1. It would be worth looking into it once you've read the brochure or seen the pictures.
