
The Eliminate Project – Changing the World by Saving and Protecting Mothers and Newborns

As a reminder of the purpose of the large blue bin passed around for donations at each meeting, the following is from the Kiwanis International web site:

Every nine minutes, an infant dies from neonatal tetanus. That short live time is marked by pain, robbing a mother of the chance to provide even the comfort of her touch. Most of these tragedies occur in countries that haven't yet eliminated maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT).

The Eliminate Project's fundraising campaign will raise US\$110 million by 2015 – eliminating MNT from the face of the Earth and protecting some of the world's most vulnerable people. Contributions flow through Kiwanis International Foundation but need to be designated to The Eliminate Project.

As of the end of February our club has raised \$1360.06 for this project, or about 45% of the goal.

Five Grant Requests Approved by the Board and One Tabled (Provided by Pete Peterson)

Board of Directors approved the following grant requests at the Feb 21st Board Meeting:

- Pool and ping pong table replacements at the Salvation Army - Lytton Springs Facility - . \$2,501.
- Insurance and umpire costs for the Cloverdale Pony Tail League - \$300. This is a young women's softball league in which Healdsburg young women participate because Healdsburg does not have a women's softball league.
- Healdsburg Science Fair \$500. We have been a supporter of this fair for many years.
- One scholarship to Tomorrow's Leaders Today -\$1,200. This organization draws student participants from Healdsburg. Junior and Senior High Schools.
- Budget of the Key Club Kiwanis Club Of Healdsburg. \$2,000.
- The remaining unpaid \$1,265 of a \$2,500 Grant to the Boys & Girls Club was removed from further consideration because: 1] No recent specific payment requests have been received; and 2] The \$2,500 grant was approved in November, 2011 and the current Directors are not obligated to carry the unpaid \$1,265 forward to the current Club fiscal year.
- Russian River Chamber Music Tabled pending further information.

The following expenses were approved by the Board:

- Storage space rental at Sun Industrial Mini-Storage \$357.50. We paid for eleven months in advance and receive the twelfth month free. This is an ongoing charge. The owners of Sun Industrial Mini-Storage, Edgar and Judy Deas, very kindly charge us only half-price for one storage unit. The unit principally stores Christmas Tree Lot gear.
- Renewal of our dues with the Healdsburg Chamber Of Commerce - \$135.
- Purchase of a second Distinguished Award plaque -\$140 +/-.
- Healdsburg Tribune ad to recruit new members -\$750.

In other action, Keith Scharer's resignation was accepted, without having received a written resignation notification, because of his move to Florida for a two year airline pilot training program.

Corporate Memberships were discussed, but Tabled for further information.

Mark Jayne, Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Redwood Wine Country Region



Mark Jayne spoke passionately at the February 26 evening meeting about the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Mark has been a LLS volunteer for three years and is an avid hiker, raising money for the cause.

The mission of The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society is: Cure leukemia, lymphoma, Hodgkin's disease and myeloma, and improve the quality of life of patients and their families. LLS is the world's largest voluntary health agency dedicated to blood cancer. LLS funds livesaving blood cancer research around the world and provides free information and support services. Key Priorities will insure that: The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society helps blood cancer patients live better, longer lives.

During the last fiscal year, LLS invested \$79.6 million in research projects in the U. S., Canada and 10 other countries. Since its founding in 1949, LLS has invested more then \$814 million in blood cancer research.

Guests at the Kiwanis Family House have immediate access to their loved one's bedside, free shuttle service to the hospital, and a staff of caring volunteers available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Kiwanis Family House provides fully furnished bedrooms and seven full hook-up Recreational Vehicle sites. Family members are registered into a private bedroom which includes a bathroom with shower, as well as access to fully-equipped kitchens and a laundry room. Guests also have internet access, free long-distance telephone calls, spiritual counseling, free parking and free shuttle bus to hospital.


