

The tree was lit, and our annual Christmas Party arrived! We were feeling a little cold (or a


little old), but warmed up with good food, mulled wine and good cheer. We sang Christmas Carols and had a White Elephant gift exchange.


# Six Objectives Award presented to Fire Academy student
