The feast was prepared by the kitchen crew led by Dick Bugarske and Patti Robarts with Lockie Gillies and his friend Marc Dym, chef and part owner of the Little River Inn at the fire grilling steaks and chicken. Several members provided an overflowing table of appetizers. There was an astonishingly sinful dessert table filled with a variety of treats prepared by several of our desert specialists.

Patti Robarts led the dining area setup and Jan and Dan attended to obtaining and serving the wine. Steve Everett and his fried Dan were the expert **Income and Expenses** bartenders. Admin Business and Service

 The following disbursement from the admin fund was approved: Brandt's Beach BBQ - up to \$3,000 for purchase of food so that all money that comes in at the event would be directed towards projects for the children's fund.

Healdsburg Kiwanis Foundation

Grants/Donations/Requests

- Third graders in the Healdsburg School, St. John's Elementary, Fitch Mountain, Alexander Valley, and West Side schools - \$20 per 3rd grader for purchase of Scholastic Books in lieu of purchasing dictionaries each year. Kiwanis stickers will be provided for teachers and students to place in the purchased books.
- Santa Rosa Symphony \$1,000 to support the elementary music program for West Side School.
- Maui Disaster Relief \$500 to support the Lahaina Kiwanis Club. It was suggested that each District Division 32 club consider that each club offer \$500 to possibly be matched by Kiwanis International to support the Kiwanis Clubs in Maui.

 Revisit supporting the Active 20/30 Club Barn Dance. Their Barn Dance is a fundraiser to support kids in the community. Can we embrace their club to support the kids of the community and possibly discuss transitioning to our club when aging out as well as volunteering at various Kiwanis events?

Aug. 1: Kathryn Hecht, Alexander Valley Film Festival – The new Plaza Cinema Center.

Kathryn presented exciting news and information about the development of the new Plaza Cinema Center.

The AVFilm Board of Directors has approved the leases for 371 Healdsburg Ave and final planning is underway for the new Plaza Cinema Center. The 3600 square foot two-story space will house 3 screening rooms on



the ground floor and a film education center on the second floor, all for the exhibition, study, and enjoyment of film and media arts.

The center will represent a physical expression of AVFilm's mission to educate, empower, and engage students of all ages though the transformative power of film.

A Capital Campaign to fund the leasehold improvements and operational growth necessary to run the Center is now underway. With permits in place, the goal is to break ground in September of this year and possibly complete the project and be open for business in the spring or early summer of 2024.

"Plaza Cinema Center will greatly enhance life in the North Bay by connecting the community with movies and each other. Through film's unique accessibility and power to unite and educate, we inspire people and stimulate dialogue. We enrich individual lives to invite a more inclusive, empathetic and informed society."
