Administration Management

F<u>inancials</u>

- The Admin Fund holds \$10,220 (including \$230 from the last incomplete lotto) plus Terry Kemp's Presidential Fund of \$453. Dues have brought in just over \$1,400.
- We have a bill from the Lt. Governor for \$1,400.
- \$45 per member for dues is currently sustaining the club.

New Business

- The 2021 Steelhead Festival has been cancelled.
- FFA booth is pending for May 2021.
- Anna hopes to make a virtual toast at the SF Kiwanian's 100th anniversary at the Tonga Room in the Fairmont Hotel.

Healdsburg Kiwanis Foundation

Grants/Donations/Requests

- Boy Scout Troop 21 \$4500. Among the expenses that need funding: Rent for Clary Hall, \$3,500; Troop re-charter fee, \$900-\$1,100; Camping equipment, \$1,250; Sponsor 2 scouts for Leader Training, \$600; Scout Class B Uniform shirts, hats, neckerchiefs, \$600; 2 Camperships at \$475 each; Awards for Advancement Badges, \$500. Troop 21 led by Doug Price has had an impressive year (See Nov. 10, Doug Price, page 4).
- Funding for Distance Learning in Healdsburg will run out in January when \$350,000 will be needed. Children are dropped off at the Community Center at 7 AM on weekdays. The program uses 9 rooms and there is a waiting list. 42 staff members are employed.
- \$4,500 has been set aside for dictionary distribution.

<u>Financials</u>

The Project Fund has \$17,143 remaining available to give for this fiscal year. The new Children's Legacy Fund now contains \$11,600. (Updated, see below)



Tuesday Zoom Meetings

Nov 3: - Kim Bender, Executive Director and **Hanna Scramaglia** - Healthcare Foundation of Northern Sonoma County

The Healthcare Foundation is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization, that raises funds in support

of all those who live and work in our region, from northern Santa Rosa to the Mendocino border. "Every person – young and old, rich and poor, sick and healthy – deserves access to and work. good healthcare – right here, close to home, where we live."

The Healthcare Foundation focuses our investments in three areas: Healthcare Access, Mental Health and Early Childhood Development.

Kim's presentation focused on healthcare needs under the current

pandemic crisis. Childhood mental health is especially critical. Surveys show that 75% of high school students are depressed and poorly motivated and many are failing. She also discussed the Team Success Program a Healdsburg and Windsor High Schools which focus on crisis intervention.

Troop 21 had a great year in 2020 despite the COVID, the Scouts worked hard on advancement we have a great group of boys working hard at developing their leadership and outdoor skills.

constructed two Stations to provide repair equipment for cyclists.


- Kevin Trebilcock Construction of outside grilling structure at St. John's Church for use in community events.

Nov 17: Duskie Estes Executive Director - Farm to Pantry www.farmtopantry.org

In 2008 Farm to Pantry was launched to serve a need in our local community to provide a continuous supply of fresh, healthy produce to our most vulnerable neighbors who lack access to it by cultivating a community of growers and volunteers.

"Farm to Pantry is a win, win, win: getting food that would be wasted, harvested by volunteers, to those in need." – Duskie Estes Here are some impressive numbers from the Farm to Pantry website:

- Since inception in 2008, gleaners have rescued over 250 tons of surplus nuts, fruits, and vegetables. That's over 2 million servings.
- About 2000 4000 pounds of produce are rescued a week, delivering weekly to over 30 locations in Sonoma County.
- Over 100 types of healthy produce have been recovered picked, sorted, weighed, boxed and delivered by over 100 volunteer donors.

But as Duskie discussed, these numbers have been eclipsed by this year's efforts during the pandemic crisis. Since restaurants are the main customers of local farms and since restaurant services have been severely restricted, crops remain unharvested in the fields. This year gleaning teams worked 6 days a week, performing 3 to 5 gleanings per day and have gleaned over 175,000 pounds of healthy produce. That's equivalent to 1.5 million servings. Teams consist of a wide variety of volunteers including many teens and younger children who glean, sort box and deliver to many distributors including the Healdsburg Food Pantry.

Nov 24: Sally Mackin, HEF



We welcomed our own Sally Mackin, Executive Director of the Healdsburg Education Foundation to our evening Zoom meeting. Sally joined the conversation and gave us an update on HEF and the recent virtual fundraiser.

The "Team up" tab shows information about the "Home & Away" teams that engaged in a peer-topeer fund raising competition to raise money for our HUSD schools and students. The Home team was made up of HUSD Alumni, parents the teachers. The Away Team included Healdsburg residents passionate about education. A total of about \$37,000 was raised with the Away Team besting the Home Team by about \$2,000.

The Shop & Dine tab lists the 15 local business sponsors who offered special promotions during the week in support of our Healdsburg public schools. This program raised about \$50,000.
