

Several thousand people enjoyed beautiful sunny weather at the annual Steelhead Festival at Lake Sonoma on Saturday February 8. Many of them were hungry and gravitated toward our food booth serving polish sausage, hot dogs, corn dogs and garlic fries. Sales were brisk.






Gross sales totaled \$3,130, expenses were \$1,032 for food and supplies, and including a fee to the Friends of Lake Sonoma for providing the food booth, for total proceeds of \$2098 for the Admin fund.

Tim Flannery Concert



Tim Flannery and the Lunatic Fringe played a fundraising concert benefitting the Kiwanis Foundation and Flannery's own nonprofit, the "Love Harder Project," on Feb. 22 at the Raven Performing Arts Theatre. The band played a medley of Flannery's self-written songs, with a bluegrass/rock/country blend.

Flannery is well known to local baseball fans, having spent 10 seasons with the San Diego Padres and later as third base coach for the San Francisco Giants from

2007 to 2014. The event

kicked off with an afternoon baseball talk for youth baseball players. A panel including former Giants pitcher Noah Lowery, Joey Gomes of the Healdsburg Prune Packers and Glen Miller, a local umpire for little league teams focused on sportsmanship and youth sports and talked about "How to be a better teammate".

About 225 people attended the concert with gross ticket sales of about \$14,000. Net proceeds for our Kiwanis Foundation were over \$9,000 pending final accounting. Our number one baseball fan organized and implemented the event, assisted by many of our member volunteers.

Financials

 The Admin Fund – the fund is slowly climbing back with recent help from Steelhead Festival proceeds of \$2,075.

Committee and Event Updates

- Golf Tournament The project is on hold because Rotary still has not received approval from their Board to partner in this event.
- St. Patrick's Day Plans are being made for our weekly lunch meeting to be at the Plaza on St. Patrick's Day where we can enjoy and support the local dancers and music that we are sponsoring. Patti will lead Key Club in making and serving green eggs and ham from 6:30 7:30 AM in front of John and Zeke's.

New Business

Meeting Programs

Feb 4: Nancy J. Martin, "From the Summer of Love to the Valley of the Moon"

Barbara Erickson introduced her cousin Nancy Martin, our February 4 speaker. Nancy is the author of *From the Summer of Love to the Valley of the Moon*, a story of her eventful life from the Summer of Love up to the present. She read several passages of the book starting in 1967 with her teenage marriage at a rock and roll wedding. Here is a description of her book from her website:

A teenager comes of age during the Summer of Love at her rock & roll wedding. Her story relates the saga of life and relationships from then until the present through many lessons learned the hard way, until when in 2005 she transitioned into yet another challenging marriage to the founder of an iconic winery in the Valley of the Moon. An inspirational narrative of one woman's perseverance, creativity and stamina to overcome the cultural norms of patriarchy through years of controlling abuse and moving on through the learning curve of personal growth. The publication of this story was inspired and encouraged by the now prominent #MeToo Movement.

Feb 11: Francesco Lecce-Chong - Santa Rosa Symphony.

Francesco Lecce-Chong, the Santa Rosa Symphony's fifth Music Director in 91 years, began his first full season in October 2019. He began his tenure as Music Director and Conductor in July of 2018 at age 31. A Solti Foundation Award winner, the Boulder, Colorado, native began conducting at the age of sixteen and graduated from the Mannes College of Music and Curtis Institute of Music.

Francisco spoke enthusiastically about the symphony programs and his role as music director. His previous gig was with the Pittsburgh Symphony where he was assistant conductor. While the Pittsburgh Symphony is ten times larger than the Santa Rosa Symphony, Francisco was very favorably impressed with our Symphony's high standards, community engagement and the youth music education program.

"The musical arts are alive and well in Santa Rosa. Few cities in America of comparable size support a regional symphony so vital, dynamic, and innovative. As the Santa Rosa Symphony gains a national reputation for stellar sound, bold excellence and community engagement, Sonoma County forges an identity as a place in love with classical music. While others struggle merely to survive, our orchestra strives for greater depth and breadth of artistry and accomplishment by:

Emily explains what is recyclable or compostable or what is not and should be thrown in the garbage

Emily Harris in a very informative discussion described the recycling and composting processes and the importance of putting the right material in the right bin.

Why recycle?

Recycling 1 ton of paper saves:

- 17 trees
- 2 barrels of oil
- 7,000 gallons of water
- 3 cubic yards of landfill space

4,100 kWh of electricity

It is becoming more difficult to find markets for recycling products. China, the former major market has a policy that limits the import of contaminated recyclable commodities and increases inspections of recyclable commodity imports. It is therefore very important not to contaminate the recycle bin with improper material such as plastic bags, rags, liquids, food waste and contaminated paper and cardboard.
