INVITATION

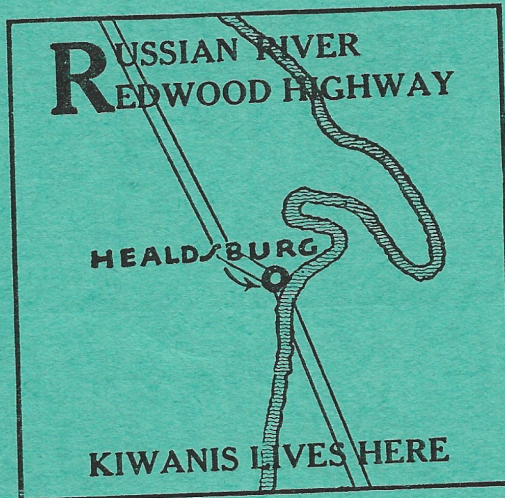

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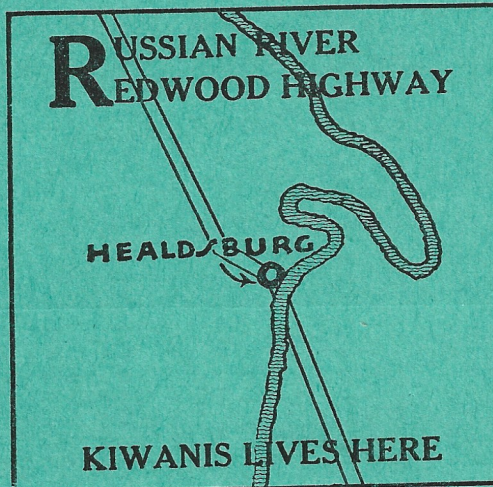

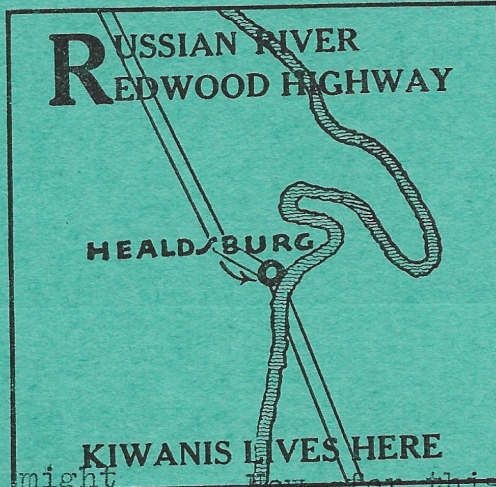

 of lazy make-up in the past.



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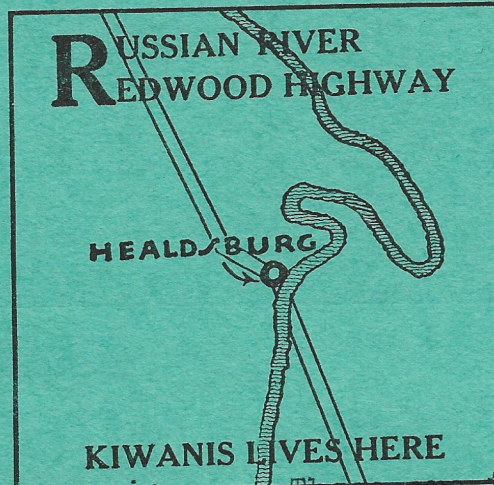
