Our Supervisor did a first rate job in convincing members to vote "yes" on Measure "A" on next Tuesday's ballot. Healdsburg will not suffer should this measure pass. The City's future is not affected by this bill as it is already set and 'course chartered' re the NCPA. Residents of the County will not suffer either. Actually the measure passes on the increased costs to our county to all other counties benefiting directly from the geothermal energies developed and produced here--costs of new roads, repairs to and maintenance of existing roads, increased police protection costs, etc. 50% of the revenues thus derived from the bill go to pay for such increased costs and 50% go to the 'General Fund' to reduce property taxes of County residents. In all this bill, which, our Supervisor initiated, would bring in 100 million dollars in additional revenues in a 30 year time span. Supervisor Nick urges us all to get out and vote and to vote 'yes' on proposition "A".




