brim brim with valuable and interesting stuff.

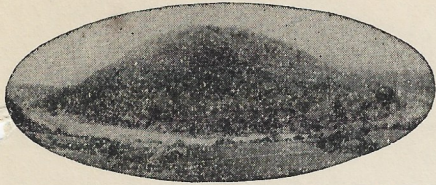
HOW MANY CAN ANSWER? Who is our International President?
