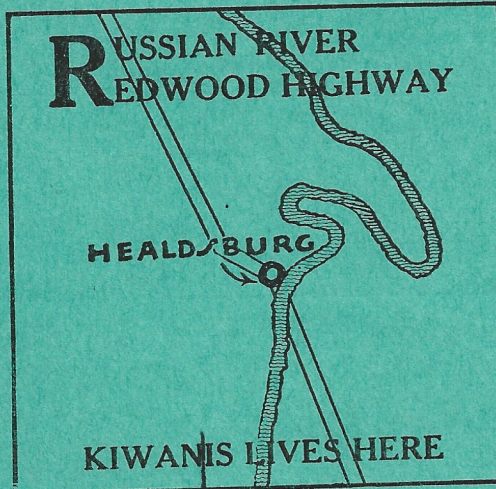

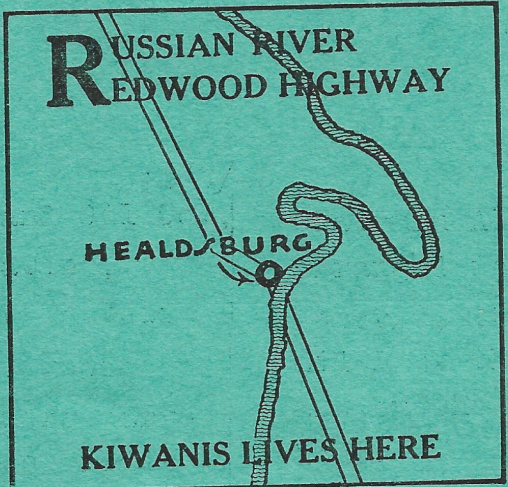

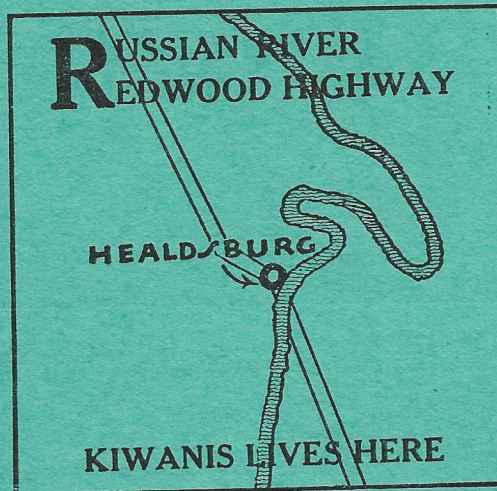

and Silent Night.



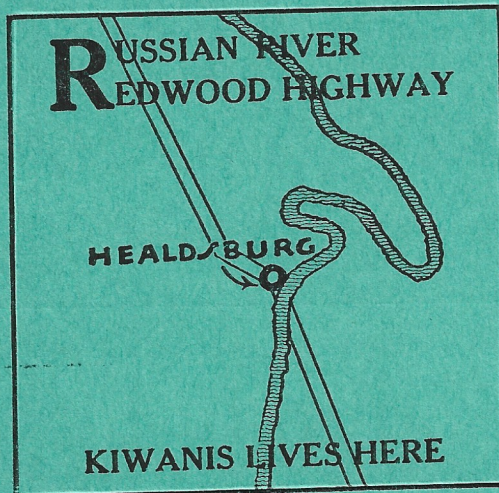

Behold the one and only "Bozo"

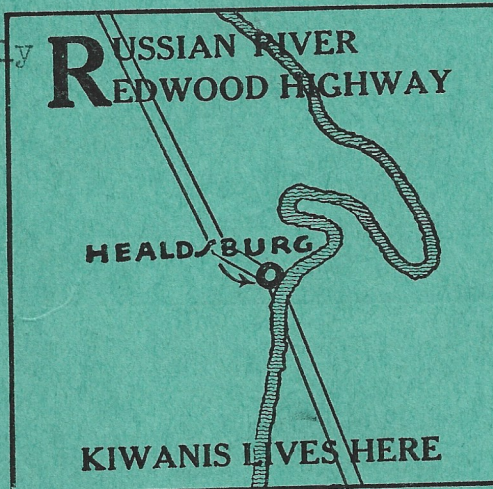
