
Kiwanis Christmas Projects In Years Past:

A second project started in the early 1930's was "Christmas Baskets To The Needy". This project was first under the supervision of the Red Cross with the Kiwanis Club paying for most of the cost and then delivering the baskets before Christmas. After many years, the Junior Chamber of Commerce took over the programs and in recent years it has been carried on by the churches in our community.

A Tribute to Russ Stevens: It was 50 years ago this month that Russell B. Stevens joined the Healdsburg Kiwanis Club. In 1934 he served as club president and in 1941 became Lt. Gov. of division 8. He held district offices in 1942 and 1943 and was elected Gov. of the Calif-Nevada District in 1944. Russ was the only man to ever serve as governor from this division of Kiwanis. He was an excellent speaker and was one of the speakers at several district conventions in the years following his governorship. From 1946 to 1955 he served on numerous committees for Kiwanis International. In 1966 he received his 35 yr. pin for 35 years of service.

Those of us who knew Russ Stevens will always remember him. as a great leader who served his community and Kiwanis well.

It was good to have Ted Kellogg back at our meeting last week. We had 68 members present last week.




