After the music, meal and santa we were presented with a spectacular cake complete with candles.

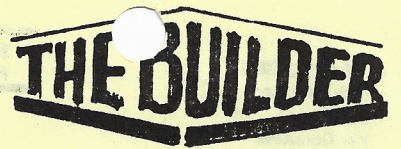
Glen Davis had a HAPPY BIRTHDAY which cost him \$5.00.

Ray Blatt will host the next regular board meeting at the Bank of America, February 3rd at 7:00 p.m.....

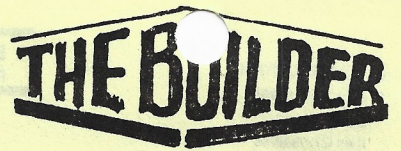

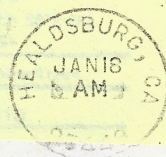

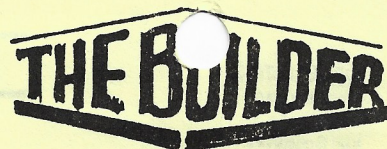

SURVEY REVEALS HEALDSBURG COMMUNITY CENTER NOT FEASIBLE AS ORIGINALLY PLANNED

LAST WEEK, Edward Monohan, a fund-raising specialist and consultant on community projects hired by the Healdsburg Community Center Board, capsulized his 50 page report.

Using a basis of extensive interviews with 50 selected Healdsburg area residents, the general consensus pattern indicated reservations about location and total dollar cost to achieve the project. A more central location with a \$1 million fund-raising goal would gather wider support. He did state, however, a project combination of a wine library-museum with the Edward Langhart Museum and a small theater, should be considered by the board.

Mr. Monohan's recommendation follows the general thinking of those surveyed.

Ed.-From a physical and logistic standpoint at this point and time, a downtown or adjacent location does not seem likely, UNLESS there is a large land gift or a major business on the size of South Bay Forest Products, vacates. Suitable buildings and parking requires considerable space. Let the Healdsburg Community Center board not give up, however!

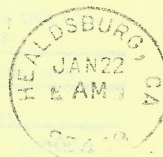
Other guests included Tom Sweeney, Press Democrat reporter, Rick Alves and two Key Clubbers, Scott Adams and Mike Hanlon.
