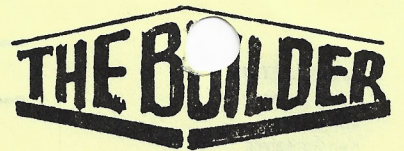

BIRTHDAY

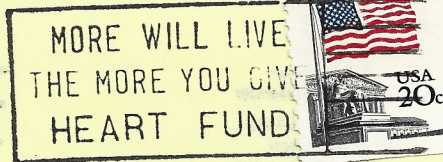
The Kiwanis Choral Society provided a lively rendition of Happy Birthday for Roger Christensen, who was overwhelmed with the quality.

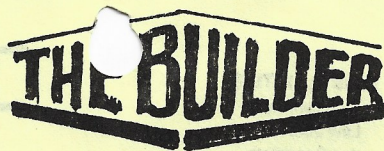
