Arnold Santucci



Update on event planning

- <u>Steelhead Festival</u>: Eric is working hard on this event which is progressing very smoothly. This is the first festival since the COVID shutdown that caused lower vendor attendance than normal.
- <u>St. Patrick's Day:</u> Susan created a beautiful flyer for the St. Patrick's Day event. Fairy houses will be available for the kids to create on site. Wood is needed for this craft. Susan will contact Cody and Denny to access their wood piles. Mini bagels with green cream cheese will be served along with Lucky Charms and popcorn by Patty.
- <u>Pancake Breakfast</u>: Susan rented a Wendell the Rabbit costume for a lucky Key Club volunteer to wear the morning of the pancake breakfast. This wabbit will sit on a bench underneath a rented white flowered arch for photos with the kids. He will also be at the plaza the day before the event to advertise the breakfast. Those wucky kids. Also, Warm Springs 4H Club will be having a Pancake Breakfast Poster Contest judged by Kiwanians with the winner earning a free pancake breakfast. The posters will then be distributed around town a week or so before the

event. Anna is working on the ABC liquor license to get permission to serve Mimosas as well. An Easter Basket could possibly be created (by Darlene Prigmore?) to be raffled off at the breakfast.

Meetings

Jan 10: 100th Anniversary Planning

Harry Jackson shared a working draft of the Kiwanis 100th Anniversary Celebration booklet being prepared to pass out on March 17th.

The booklet will contain articles about our club, including history, fund raising projects, youth organizations we support etc. and recognize our sponsors and supporters along with advertising they have purchased. A page is devoted to each of our anniversary events.

Jan 17: Cindy Brown, Bees

The January 17 speaker was our own Cindi Brown a skilled apiarist. She shared some interesting



facts about honeybees, their care and the challenges of taking care of her bees during the last few drought years.

Humans have been practicing apiculture (bee keeping) for a long time. There are images that are 10,000 years old that show honey being collected from bees. Egyptian art shows evidence of domesticated bees 4,500 years ago.

Cindi described the bee's life cycle and the swarming process. The workers prepare a nest for the queen to lay her eggs and eventually a new queen is born. When the new queen has matured and ready to take over, the old queen leaves the hive, taking some of the bees with her. The swarm usually lands in a nearby tree. Cindi tries to keep them before they move on by luring them into a bee trap and transferring to a new hive.

The drought years were hard for the bees. Cindi's hives were reduced from 6 to 4. There was not enough nectar in the flowers to feed the bees and they suffered greatly from the lack of water.

A healthy bee population is very important for our agriculture and bees need our help. We can help bees by planting pollen producing shrubs and flowers, providing water and using non-toxic pesticides.

Jan 24: Loretta and Jerry



Loretta and Jerry delivered Chapter 2 of their Mediterranean cruise adventure in a very interesting slide show. Loretta described the second leg of their cruise, following their sail down the Dalmatian Coast. They sailed on to the Greek Islands, first visiting Corfu in the Ionian Sea, then sailing on to Cephalonia, Santorini, and Crete, and finally ending their adventures in Athens.

The nation of Greece is a peninsula surrounded by the Ionic, Mediterranean and Aegean Seas with about 3000 islands, 227 of which are inhabited.

Loretta described the many interesting scenic and historic sites visited including 3500-yearold olive trees planted by the Phoenicians on Corfu, beautiful bougainvillea, and the whitewashed buildings in Santorini. They visited many Orthodox churches, interesting for their architecture, interior décor, art, and religious imagery much different from Roman Catholic churches familiar in the western world.

In Athens they visited the many historic sites, highlighted by Jerry's climb to the top of the Acropolis, an awesome achievement for a gentleman of 89.

January's social evening meeting was hosted by Dan and Jan Gianni with a blind wine tasting and charcuterie prepared by Patti that were enjoyed by all. The evening ended with a raffle of unique wines going to the winners.

Club receives large donations of wine

In the past year, thanks to Denny's Cloverdale connections and to Lucy Lewand's generosity we have had two large donations of bottled wine. It was decided that we share some of the wine through a "free" wine raffle drawing at each meeting. Upon arrival at each meeting, attendees will get a raffle ticket and sometime during the meeting there will be a drawing for 1 or 2 bottles of donated wine.

We make no judgement as to the quality of the "raffle wine" and hope that it will be a fun moment at our meetings.

- Your humbleness and kindness were recognized in the moment, and in the precious memories many, many people have of growing up or raising families in Healdsburg.


