
Ben Dryer and Ian Nimmo Chosen Students of the Month for December and January

Healdsburg High School Key Club members are continuing to tutor grade schoolers in reading, an ongoing project. To raise funds for the hungry, club members underwent a 30 hour famine on February 27-28 and they are also raising funds for the Kiwanis House. And the election of new club officers will be held soon and delegates will be attending the annual convention.

Board Purchases Five Kiwanis House Bricks Honoring Members


To help the Kiwanis House located in Sacramento in its ongoing goal to raise funds, the board, at its March 11 meeting, agreed to purchase five gold bricks in honor of club members. Two bricks were dedicated to the memory of long time members Art McCaffrey and Ken Turnbow and in honor of past Lt. Governor Alvie Rochester. The other two bricks will be dedicated at a later date.

In other action the board donated \$1,000, at the request of Roger Dormire to the North County Community Services, an affiliate of St. Paul's Episcopal Church . NCCS' main purpose is to help the homeless and families in need of shelter. NCCS operates the Spare Room at St. Paul's for overnight shelter, the Wallace House in Cloverdale for transient families, the Holbrook House in Healdsburg also for transient families, and manage the City of Healdsburg's Victory

Apartments for low income and transient families in Healdsburg (next to St. Paul's Church on East Street).

The board also approved the distribution of the funds brought in by the Christmas trees sale. \$10,000 will be kept in the bank account set up for the Christmas Tree project, \$20,000 will be placed in the Project Fund and \$8,000, by previous action, was given to the Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club to install a new heating system in the Boys and Girls Club building. A small part of the \$8,000 donation was used to renovate a storage room into the computer room and to purchase chairs for that room. The computers were purchased by the Boys and Girls Club through a grant.

The board also approved a leave of absence to Tom Rackerby and senior status to Vince Dougherty.




