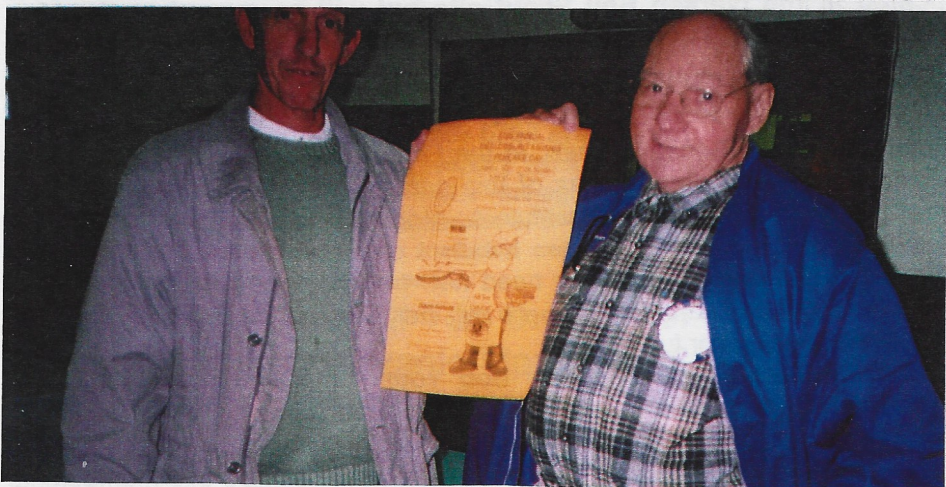
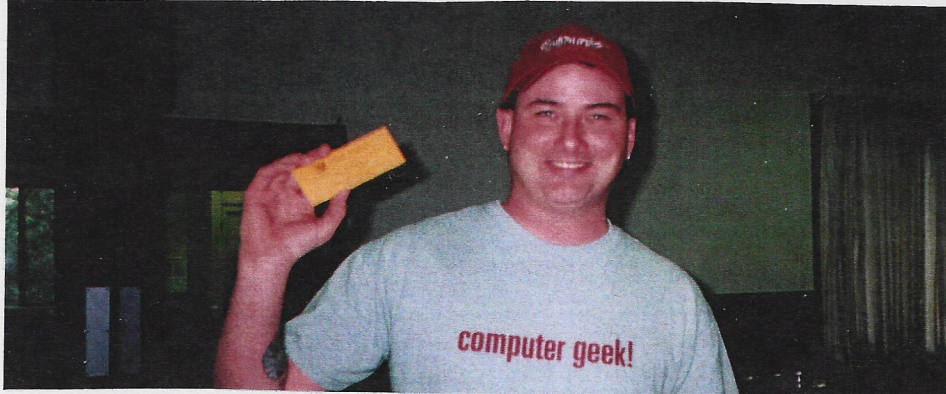

Museum, City Council Top the List of Service Hours by Kiwanis Members

Topping the list of organizations Kiwanis Club members donated service hours was the Healdsburg City Council with 85 hours followed by the Healdsburg Museum with 48.5 hours and the Healdsburg Chamber of Commerce with 45 hours.

In total club members donated 385 hours of community service during the month of February. In comparison Community Service Hours in January came to 488.

\$18,135 Project Fund Disbursement Approved by Board at February Meet

The Kiwanis board of directors at the club's February 8th meeting agreed to assist a diverse group of organizations, all aimed at helping the children and youth of the community.

A total of \$18,135 was directed to be disbursed to the following: \$350 to Canine Companion to help with the cost of their reception for the organization's next fund raiser; \$1400 to the City of Healdsburg's 150th Anniversary Committee (the board approved with the provision that the grant not be controlled by the City of Healdsburg); \$1400 to the Healdsburg Junior High School Garden Revitalization program; \$2,000 to the Russian River Chamber Music Association (grant restricted to Healdsburg Youth Music Programs); \$3,000 Agricultural Class books for the Healdsburg High School (disbursement deferred until the need for the books verified or an alternate project is approved. Final disbursement to be made by the Healdsburg Education Foundation); \$9,985 to Healdsburg Education Foundation, restricted as follows: \$800 Healdsburg Junior High School Sports Program, \$1,1775 for a Gymnasium Sign at the Healdsburg Junior High School, \$1,890 for 16 Triple-Beam Weight Scales at the Healdsburg Junior High School, \$2,920 for 16 Optical microscopes for the Healdsburg Junior High School and \$2,600 for Ceramics Kiln Shelving at Healdsburg High .

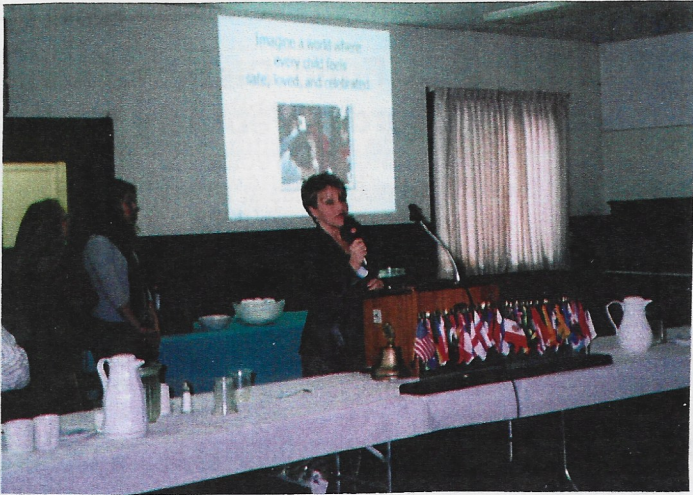
In other business the board approved a donation of \$100 to the Healdsburg Museum Endowment Fund in memory of Betsy Bippart; a \$200 donation to the Kiwanis Presidential Freedom Scholarship Program as requested by Lt. Gov. Bob Young; a donation of \$100 to the Cloverdale Key Club to help with their fundraiser.

In the absence of president Roger Dormire, first vice president Lockie Gillies presided.
