Kiwanis History (8/26/40 Tribune)

During the early summer of 1923 Kiwanians from the Napa club conferred with several Healdsburg business men, the first conference being held at the undertaking parlors of Fred Young.

On July 3, 1923 fifty Healdsburg men attended the first club luncheon held at the Plaza hotel. Eight members of the Napa club were in attendance to start things off right. J.H. Miller was elected president; Geo. N. Imrie, vice president; J.R. Williams second vice president; Fred R. Young, sergeant at arms; George Hayes, treasurer; M.E. Cummings, district trustee, and the following directors; H.B. Rosenberg, W.A. Hill, Geo. H. Warfield, R.G. Cook, L.J. Hall, J. Walter Seawell and Edward Quinn

A charter night dinner and presentation ceremony was held on Nov. 3, 1923 and the club officially given the go ahead by Kiwanis International. It still flourishes strongly, with 50 members at the present time.

Officers this year include M. Earle Adams, president; Paul Crabb, vice president; L.J. Hall, treasurer; O.H. Price, sergeant at arms; directors include; W.R. Haley, L.A. Killingsworth, S.H. Cooley, Al Huddart, Ira Rosenberg, Owen Sweeten and Ed. R. Norton.

The club has been very active all during its life, assisting other civic organizations in the community, helping put over improvements, has aided underprivileged children, particularly at the Lytton Salvation Army home, reorganized the chamber of commerce when that group got into the doldrums, organized a 20-30 club of young men of the community in 1938, and has been active at all city elections in getting the voters to the polls as an aid to good citizenship.

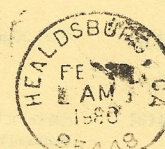
The ladies night program is an excellent opportunity for new members and their spouses to get better acquainted with all of us. We sure hope you can make it.

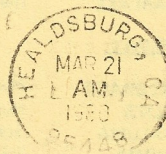
