Steelhead Festival

The Lake Sonoma Steelhead Festival returned to the grounds of the Milt Brandt Visitor Center on Saturday, Feb. 11, 2023, following a 2-year COVID pandemic hiatus. The festival is sponsored by the Friends of Lake Sonoma and proceeds are used to charter buses to bring children to the visitor's center and fish hatchery.

The weather cleared after a night of showers and was nearly perfect for February. Many of the crowd of 5,000-6,000 people enjoying the festivities were hungry and visited our food booth serving polish sausage, hot dogs, corn dogs. garlic fries and for the first time this year, chili. Sales were brisk.



Eric Smith led a motley crew working two shifts who worked very hard to keep up with the line of customers during the rush.

We took in \$3,753. With approx. \$1,500 in expenses the 10% fee (\$182) going to the Friends of Lake Sonoma, the net taken to the bank was about \$2,071. The





total expenses were kept low by \$435 in free food via 29 vouchers donated by local stores.

Admin Business and Service

• A motion was passed approving the resignation of Dick Bugarske as copresident with Eric Smith taking on full responsibilities for the 2023-24 year.

President's Update:

- We are fundraising for the 100th anniversary and for our own club. Packets have been sent out to support the Expo and other events for donations and funds are starting to come in.
- The Governor is coming on March 4th to Petaluma at the Yacht Club and needs a gift basket as well as participation from 9:00-1:00 pm, including lunch.

Event Updates

- Steelhead Festival: The final sum raised from the festival is a little over \$2,200 with these proceeds going towards the Administration fund.
- <u>St. Patrick's Day:</u> Susan created a beautiful flyer for the St. Patrick's Day event. Fairy houses will be available for the kids to create on-site. Mini bagels with green cream cheese will be served along with Lucky Charms popcorn by Patty. Games with prizes and a face-painting station will be available from 10:30- 2:30. A band along with the Shiloh dancers will perform from 12:00-1:30. Advertising from Allevents was created and ready for FB push by users. Healdsburg Tribune is offering a non-profit advertising rate

for this event at \$134 for a 3x5 space. Also, advertising could be purchased with the Press Democrat. A motion passed to put ads in the Healdsburg Tribune for the Pancake Breakfast and the St Paddy's Day Events for 2 weeks before each event at \$134 per week per event.

- Pancake Breakfast: Susan rented a Wendell the Rabbit costume for a lucky Key Club volunteer to wear the morning of the pancake breakfast. This wabbit will sit on a bench underneath a rented white flowered arch for photos with the kids. He will also be at the plaza the day before the event to advertise the breakfast. Those wucky kids. The Warm Springs 4-H Club will be having a Pancake Breakfast Poster Contest judged by Kiwanians with the winner earning a free pancake breakfast. The posters will then be distributed around town a week or so before the event. Anna is working on the ABC liquor license to get permission to serve Mimosas as well. Two Easter baskets will be created by Darlene Prigmore to be raffled off at the breakfast.
- <u>Safety Fair Parking:</u> We continue to receive applications for vendors to attend the event. Parking monitors, and other details continue to be worked on. The superintendent is giving permission to use the high school parking lot as an overflow lot to shuttle people to the event. The county will donate a couple of buses to transport guests to the event.
- <u>FFA Fair:</u> This month we should get approval for a stage, musicians, games, prizes, and children's events. Information for the parade itself was sent to other clubs to participate along with us. The FFA counsel will gather to choose a new Grand Marshall in the near future and an announcement will be made henceforth.

Feb 21: Barbara Walsh, Sonoma County Grand Jury

Barbara told us all about Grand Juries – what they do and how they do it, and her experiences as a member of the Sonoma County Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury is made up of 19 qualified, randomly selected citizen volunteers, from a pool of applicants and impaneled by the Sonoma County Superior Court to act as an "arm of the court". The Jury serves as a "watchdog" by investigating and reporting on the operations of local government, including the county, cities, and special districts within the county.

The grand jury's fact-finding efforts, conducted with total confidentiality, result in written reports that are aimed at identifying problems and offering recommendations for improving government operations. In this way, the grand jury acts as a representative of county residents in promoting government accountability.

Each grand jury is free to choose which local governmental entities or public officials to investigate. No one outside the grand jury can direct it to investigate. Ideas for investigations generally come from:

- Citizen complaints,
- Matters raised by the members of the grand jury, and
- Referrals from the preceding grand jury.
