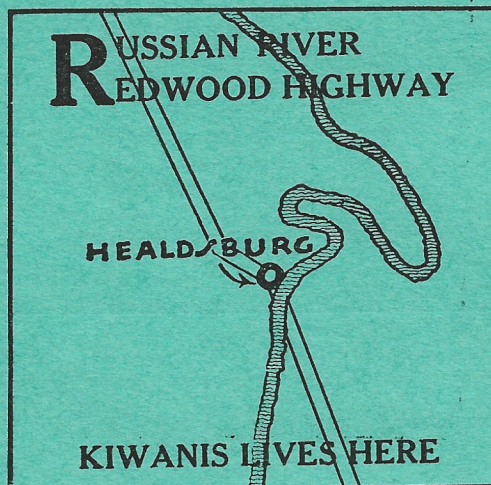

Echoes from the old archives: "George Imrie gave his herring some water and trudged along with the other boys down to Fred's place. That made a party of five. --- Same bunch got together again at the undertaking parlors. This time they added some more fellows. --- From that meeting they adjourned to meet at the Healdsburg Legion Hall, June 25th, 1923. About 25 of the good Kiwanian bunch came over from Napa. --- They appointed the "Key-men". --- They appointed Doc Wright, Fred Young, Joe Miller and George Imrie as the boss Keymen. --- Joe Miller was named for President, Ralph Williams for Secretary and George Imrie for Treasurer. June 29th, 1923, a meeting was held at Plaza Hotel. --- The Napa Kiwanis Club was the God-father of the Healdsburg Club. At that meeting they sang for us and told a lot of stories. --- Permanent officers: Joe Miller, President, George Imrie, Vice President and Charlie Comstock, Secretary." We're still serving and singing to day. Eighteen of the old boys left.
