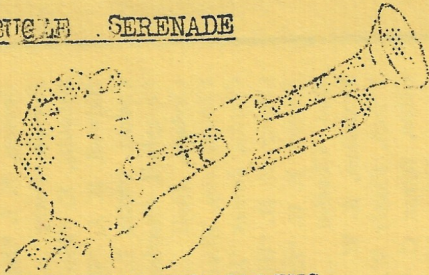
THIS WEEK
