The following is a summary of actions taken and items discussed during the March 2022 Board meeting:

Administration Management

Financials

- The Administrative Treasurer’s Report was approved.
- Total Administrative fund assets are \$14,076, allocated as follows: \$4,076 Admin Fund, \$10,000 Admin Fund Reserve. The Charity Fund contains \$86.

Other Business:

- Dick Burgarske shared the “Challenges from Kiwanis International to Local Clubs” handout. We might want to look at these suggestions on how to effectively connect with the community in the future as we go into our 2nd 100 years with the club. We need to research and commit to social media sites to bring us current with the younger generation of the community

Grants/Donations/Requests

- The Kiwanis House is reaching out to all clubs for financial support. A discussion will be held at the general meeting to consider a possible field trip to the Kiwanis House to better understand the purpose and set up of the facility.

President’s Update:

Committee and Events Update:

Roger Dormire Memorial Scholarship

Loretta Strong proposes designing the Roger Dormire Memorial Scholarship for Volunteerism and Altruism with the scholarship recipients to exhibit the following characteristics:

1. Minimum academic GPA of 2.50;
2. Member of an organized sports team for 3-4 years at the secondary level;
3. Volunteer hours at the local community level and beyond on a consistent basis;
4. Engaged in humanitarian projects or service duties dedicated to those in need;
5. Participate on a regular basis in faith-based or other organized spiritual services;
6. Letters of recommendation from counselors, educators or clergy demonstrating character of ethical leadership and altruistic spirit.

Given the current fund raising we could be awarding \$1,000 for the next 5 years at which time we could reevaluate continuation of the Scholarship which could possibly take other shapes. We will

offer the scholarship for the first time next year to the graduating class of 2023. A motion was approved for designing the Roger Dormire Memorial Scholarship as presented above.

Permits and preliminary paperwork have been completed. We are waiting on insurance from Brandt's Insurance and are now focusing on the advertising phase of the event. Ron will be reaching out to the club in the near future to help with various tasks that need to be completed. Although he will gladly assist with future events, this will be Ron's last year organizing the Fitch Mountain Footrace.

Mar 8. Hayley Bly, Capital improvement plans for the Healdsburg Boys and Girls Club.

The Boys and Girls Clubs of Sonoma Marin are returning to full operation following some difficult times during the COVID-19 pandemic. Services were greatly reduced because of staff shortages and the requirement restricting the number of kids together in one place at one time to 12. Some of the clubs were completely closed and those remaining open could only serve a reduced membership.

A new rebuilt and enlarged clubhouse is planned for the Healdsburg Club. The clubhouse will be located on the present Piper Street site and will be completely new except for the gym that will be retained. A larger clubhouse will accommodate 27% more kids and space will be available for expanded programs and will include a full commercial kitchen, gaming and technical facilities and a teen center located on the second floor.

Total costs are estimated at \$10 million, including architecture and engineering, permits, existing building remodel, new construction, new teen center, internal furnishings, external landscaping, and a \$2 million Club Endowment. Grand opening is scheduled for the Spring of 2024.

Mar 22: Food for Thought - Helen Myers

Last year, Food for Thought provided healing nutrition and compassion to more than 6,500 people living with serious medical conditions in Sonoma County. More than 300,000 meals per year are supplied at no charge to qualified clients who are at risk of malnutrition. The services eliminate food insecurity, reduce hospital visits and medical expenses, and improve clients' health and quality of life. Comprehensive nutrition services are provided to thousands of Sonoma County residents affected by HIV, COVID-19, cancer, and other serious medical conditions. The services are confidential and provided at no cost to clients in a welcoming and beautiful environment.



All clients are welcome to receive weekly groceries, vitamins and dietary supplements and nutrition counseling. Groceries are delivered to clients who are homebound due to illness, lack of transportation or isolation due to COVID-19. Clients who are unable to prepare food for themselves may receive frozen meals by applying through their case manager or doctor.

Volunteer opportunities are available at the food bank, as delivery drivers, in the garden, and in the kitchen.

Museum Curator Holly Hoods welcomes Kiwanians

The Healdsburg Museum & Historical Society collects, protects, preserves and interprets the artifacts, documents and photographs that trace the rich history of Healdsburg and surrounding area through exhibits, educational programs and historical research. We hold these objects in trust for present and future generations, understanding that the ties to our past, when woven with the experiences of our present, build the bridges to our future.

The current display entitled: From "Diggers Bend to River Rock: Dry Creek Rancheria People and History" features the history and culture of native American people and stories about two local Northern Sonoma County tribes, the Dry Creek Pomo and the Western Wappo.



The highlight of the Exhibition is the large collection of baskets woven by Dry Creek Rancheria makers from the museum's own collection and on loan from Private basket collectors, Tribal families, and UC Berkeley's Phoebe A. Hearst Museum of Anthropology. Woven around 1900, the baskets were made for sale, and thus designed to appeal to non-Native buyers. The weavers of the time developed a particular regional style that incorporated a variety of multi-hued, sparkling glass beads and richly colored bird feathers.
