Currently the enrollment is about 200, half from Northern California, a quarter from surrounding states and the balance from overseas. These are very major changes so Healdsburg will see and hear much more of the Academy and it's students. (Overheard: the police chief said that in 20 years there had only been two students involved with the police and then, in a manner that was not criminal.)

This week's speaker was Lieutenant Kevin Reimer of the US Coast Guard who is Comptroller at the Two Rock Coast Guard training base, west of Petaluma. You've read the proposal to close this base; Lt. Reemer confirmed the proposal is still pending. It's quite evident the Service suffers from low funds; the ships are ancient and they don't have the personnel that they should have. The tasks of the CG are extensive. We know of their lifesaving but not their full responsibilities; there's stemming illegal immigration, environmental enforcement and cleanup; drug patrolling, fisheries control, aids to navigation and even ice breaking. Two Rock has 1000 trainees, 50 civilians and 350 permanent cadre; it is important to our area's economy. Lt. Reemer said that you could visit the facility. Know a young person looking for a start in life? Call Reemer and visit the base with that person at a Friday evening meal.

AS I WAS LOOKING THROUGH THE CURRENT ISSUE OF KIWANIS MAGAZINE, THE FOLLOW-ARTICLE CAUGHT MY ATTENTION AND I WOULD LIKE TO SHARE SAME WITH YOU. IT IS ENTITLED "FORMER AGENT STILL RALLYING THE TROOPS".
RENE DEFOURNEAUX BEGAN HIS CAREER IN THE U,S, MILITARY INTELLIGENCE DURING

WORLD WAR II BY PARACHUTING ALONE INTO NAZI OCCUPIED FRANCE TO HELP TRAIN AND ORGANIZE RESISTANCE FIGHTERS. AFTER THE LIBERATION OF PARIS, HE WAS TRANSFERRED TO ASIA, WHERE HE WAS SECOND IN COMMAND OF A TEAM OF SOLDIERS THAT PARACHUTED INTO FRENCH INDOCHINA TO SUPPORT GUERILLA OPERATIONS AGAINST THE JAPANESE WHO HELD THE PENINSULA.

DURING HIS STINT IN SOUTHEAST ASIA, THE INTELLIGENCE OFFICER TRAINED HUNDREDS OF PEOPLE IN CLANDESTINE OPERATIONS, COMPLETED A NUMBER OF COVERTASSIGNMENTS, AND HAD BRUSHES WITH THE HEADS OF THE OPIUM TRADE IN LAOS.HIS ABILITY TO OVERCOME DIVERSITY DESPITE THE PERILS OF HIS WORK PROMPTED ASSOCIATES TO CALL HIM "THE FOX" WHICH HE CHANGED TO "THE WINKING FOX" BECAUSE HE DIDN"T TAKE THE NICKNAME SERIOUSLY. HE ENDED HIS U.S. ARMY CAREER AT FORT BENJAMIN CHARRISON IN INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, WHERE HE RETIRED IN 1965 WITH THE RANK OF MAJOR AFTER TWENTY TWO YEARS OF MILITARYSERVICE.

SO WHAT DOES A FORMER SABOTEUR AND GUERRILLA ORGANIZER DO FOR SELF-FULFILL

MENT? IF YOU'RE RENE DEFOURNEAUX, YOU JOIN A LOCAL KIWANIS CLUB AND BECOME A WAR-HORSE IN PROVIDING COMMUNITY SERVICE.
WE DO A LOT OF GREAT THINGS IN OUR COMMUNITY, SAYS THE TWENTY THREE YEAR VETERAN OF THE KIWANIS CLUB OF INDIANAPOLIS. THE PEOPLE I ASSOCIATE WITH, LIKE ALL KIWANIANS, ARE REALLY GREAT PEOPLE. YOU ASK THEM FOR HELP, AND THEY ARE READY TO JUMP INTO ACTION.

"I COULD JUST GIVE MONEY TO GOOD CAUSES, BUT WHEN YOU GIVE MONEY YOU NEVER KNOW HOW IT IS BEING SPENT. KEEPING BUSY AND ACTIVE IN KIWANIS PROJECTS IS FANTASTIC BECAUSE YOU CAN ACTUALLY SEE THE FRUITS OF YOUR EFFORTS" RENE HAS A HISTORY OF BEING ACTIVE. AS A YOUNG FRENCHMAN A FEW YEARS BEFORE THE START OF WORLD WAR II, HE CAME TO THE U.S. WITH HIS MOTHER AND SISTER TO JOIN HIS FATHER, WHO HAD EMIGRATED SEVERAL YEARS EARLIER. DISHEARTENED BY THE DESPERATE MILITARY SITUATION IN EUROPE IN 1943, HE

JOINED THE U.S. ARMY, WAS TRAINED AS AN INTELLIGENCE SPECIALIST, AND WAS SENT TO ENGLAND TO JOIN A UNIT AS AN INTERROGATOR.

RENE SHOWED IMMEDIATE TALENT AND WAS SENT TO LONDON FOR SPECIAL TRAINING.

THERE HE LEARNED HOW TO HANDLE PLASTIC EXPLOSIVES, BLOW UP BRIDGES, DESTROY LOCOMOTIVES AND COMMUNICATE BY USING MORSE CODE. HIS INTELLIGENCE EXPER-IENCE IS DETAILED IN THE WINKING FOX, A BOOK HE WROTE THAT WAS PUBLISHED IN 1997.

AS A SEVENTY-SEVEN YEAR OLD RETIREE, RENE NO LONGER HAS A NEED FOR THOSE SKILLS. HE STILL DRAWS UPON HIS GIFTS OF LEADERSHIP, THOUGH, IN HIS ACTIVITIES AS A KIWANIAN. THIS IS ESPECIALLY TRUE IN HIS FAVORITE PROJECT: WORKING AS A COORDINATOR FOR THE ANNUAL SALVATION ARMY BELL RINGING DRIVE IN INDIANAPOLIS.

I HAVE TO BEAT THE BUSHES TO COME UP WITH VOLUNTEERS, BUT I'VE YET TO BE SHORT-HANDED, SAYS RENE, WHO'S BEEN INVOLVED IN THE CAMPAIGN FOR SEVERAL YEARS RUNNING. I ALSO HAVE TO MAKE THE ROUNDS OF THE SITES TO SET THEM UP AND MAKE SURE THE VOLUNTEERS SHOW UP. THEN I COLLECT THE MONEY AT THE END OF EACH DAY.

"IT'S A LOT OF WORK, BUT I BELIEVE THE SALVATION ARMY IS A WORTHWHILE ORGANIZATION DESERVING OF OUR SUPPORT. WHEN I WAS OVERSEAS IN THE MILITARY, THE SALVATION ARMY WAS THERE PROVIDING SERVICES TO THE NEEDY".
