Last year 350 runners took part in the annual Fitch Mountain Foot Race and this year it is estimated that 500 will participate in the event which will raise funds for the Healdsburg Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Off and Running at the Annual Fitch Mountain Foot Race Scheduled for Sunday, June 13

David Jones, chairman of the Fitch Mountain Foot Race and his committee, are planning to host 150 more runners than last year in the annual 10K and 3K race set to take place on Sunday, June 13 starting at the Plaza Square at 8 a.m. The net income from the race will be invested in the Healdsburg Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship Fund which generates some of the funding for the club's scholarships awarded to Healdsburg High School graduating seniors.

David advised that partnering with Heart and Sole Sports this year the club was able to reach more participants. However, the committee agreed to limit the number of runners to 500 "so as not to overwhelm the police department."

Again this year the Fitch Mountain Foot Race will feature two categories – 10K and 3K run/walk and there are 14 age groupings in each division from 12 years of age to 80 and over. The course takes the runners through neighborhoods and out around Fitch Mountain bordering the Russian River.

This is an all-members event and club members are reminded that one of the most important duties for the sponsor is to provide safety for the runners. That is why there is a club member as a Traffic Monitor at each street intersection along the course. Traffic Monitor assignments and rules will be available from the chairman and his committee.

The awards will be presented in the Plaza Square following the race where refreshments will be available for all participants. Winners in each cargory will receive a medallion.

Pre-registration fees to enter the race are \$25 for adults (13-59) and \$20 (Children 12 & under and seniors 60 plus) by June 9. After that date adults are \$30 and children/seniors \$25. All registered runners receive a comemorative T-Shirt. Registration forms are available from Jerry Strong.

Important Changes for 2010-1011

Dear Healdsburg Kiwanians:

I need to bring you up to date on some important changes to our club administration. At the last meeting of the board of directors on May 20th, I accepted the formal resignation of Bob Taylor as 1st Vice President. He is not resigning from the club, thankfully, and will continue as Pancake Breakfast chairman. He is stepping down as 1st Vice President and effective October 1st we will install 2nd Vice President Dick Bugarske as your new president. Dick will be an outstanding president, is ready to go having served closely at my side during my term.

The board of directors spent several months as you know reviewing the by-laws and the possibility of a 2-year presidency. After much analysis it was decided that the potential negatives could outweigh in some cases the greater benefits. Some important revisions were made, however, which have resulted in the elimination of the 2 vice president positions. Instead, the club will approve one individual as President Elect and this officer will work closely as an Executive Committee with the past president and the current president. This will strengthen the role of club president and include a description of job duties and functions that the club expects to be implemented. The Pancake and Speaker Program will be standing committees like the Fitch Mountain Foot Race and the Christmas Tree Lot and will not fall to one new individual each year.

Lastly, the board of directors has requested that the process of announcing vacancies and recruiting candidates be as inclusive and transparent as possible so that all interested individuals have the opportunity to explore their interests and intentions. Hopefully, this process will facilitate the often arduous task of our nominating committee.

In closing I wish to say that I am so extremely pleased with all that we have done so far this year. The meeting at Tayman Park was truly memorable – the food, the company and the talent of Jennifer Farmer Bugarske.



Board Approves Changes in By-Laws, Eliminates Vice Presidents Positions, OKs Donation To Scouts

A number of changes in the club's by=laws were approved by the board of directors at its May 20th meeting. As previously announced the tenure for the president will be one year. However, the president can submit his/her name to the nominating committee if he/she wishes to serve another term.

The board accepted the resignation of Bob Taylor as first vice president. However, he did not resign from the club and will stay on as chairman of the Pancake Breakfast committee. Dick Bugarske, second vice president, will become the 2010-2011 president when he is installed on October 1. The offices of first and second vice president will be eliminated and in place of those two positions will be created the office of president-elect. This person will work closely with the past president and the current president to help the current president in his/her duties. The duties of the two vice presidents will become part of standing committees i.e. Pancake Breakfast Committee and the Program Committee. In other business the board approved an allocation of \$4,590 for Boy Scout Troop 21. The troop operates under the sponsorship of the club and has for over 70 years.

Also approved was a request for \$500 to help offset the dinner honoring the Healdsburg High School's Basketball team.

Deferred until June was a request for \$700 from the Hockert Foundation for \$700 to help with the costs of the Girls Basketball summer program.

Tom Barron's request for senior status received board approval.

Program Chairman Will Present Four Exciting Programs in June

Patch Guglielmino of Healdsburg will be the geust speaker on June 1, Her topic will be "Creating A Wellness Program at Sutter Hospital". She spoke to the club a few years ago when she related her experiences as a volunteer following the bombing of the towers in New York.

Daniel Bunting, who spent fifty years as a teacher/administrator in Sonoma County, will talk about his experiences in Berlin as a teenager after World War 11 during the Berlin Airlift when Harry Truman was president of the United States. He is scheduled to speak on June 8.

Jeff Mall, owner of Healdsburg's Zin Restaurant, will be the guest speaker on June 15 and for the Tuesday evening meeting, June 22, Amy Racina, author of "Angels in he Wilderness" will tell us of her experiences as a solo backpacker who fell sixty feet onto solid granite near the remote Tehipite Valley in King's Canyon National Park in the Sierra Nevada during a 16-day hiking trip. She was airlifted after four days alone and suffered many injuries and underwent many surgeries.

City Council Approves Naming Recreation Park Grandstand in Honor of Clarence Ruonavaara

Speaking before the members of the club for the second time, Ray Holle, representing the Committee To Renovate the Grandstand at Recreation Park, told the assembled members that on June 19 the Grandstand Renovation groundbreaking ceremony will take place at 11:30 a.m. at which time the Grandstand will be named in honor of Clarence Ruonavaara who, he said, embodies the spirit of community involvement and volunteerism.

Clarence, a retired teacher/school administrator, was a member of the Healdsburg Lighting Committee who sold bonds in the late 1940's, in a very short time, to pay for the lights in Recreation Park A 29 year member of the Kiwanis Club, Clarence has been very active in the community devoting time and energy to many organizations and programs including the American Field Service Exchange Students Program (He and Betty and their two sons, Jim and Tom, hosted two exchange students)) and for many years helped with the AFS fund raiser – the Community Christmas Card which is ongoing. However his "passion was baseball", He played for the Healdsburg High School team, at the

Santa Rosa Junior College and at UC Berkeley. A World War II naval pilot, he returned to Healdsburg to teach and played ball with the Prune Packers and the Odd Fellows team. As such, it is indeed fitting that Clarence should be honored by having the Grandstand named for him.

Clarence was also honored by the Healdsburg Museum with the prestigious History Lives/Pioneer Award in 2007.

Ray Holley, in his remarks said that the Healdsburg community has been very generous in the funding of the Grandstand renovation project and that the goal of \$400,000 has almost been reached. However, he advised that the committee hopes to raise another \$100,000 so the plan to increase the size of the dugout and to add storage space to the grandstand can be realized.

Saturday, June 19 has been declared "Healdsburg Day at Recreation Park" and many activities have been planned including a pancake breakfast hosted by the Kiwanis club from 9a.m. .to 11:30 a.m., a groundbreaking ceremony at 11:30 a.m., carnival from 12 to 4, home run derby from 4-5 p.m. and a family barbecue from 5 to 8 p.m.

Proceeds from the event will be used for the grandstand renovation project.

Holley, in speaking of the special places that make Healdsburg what it is said that "The Plaza is the city's living room" and "Recreation Park the city's family room" where the local residents enjoy the many events and programs and is utilized by young and old.

Over One Million In Scholarships To High School Class of 2010

In her report on May 18 . to the club members following the May 17 awards night at the Healdsburg High School, president Loretta Strong praised how well the program was conducted and revealed the names of the Kiwanis Club Scholarship recipients. She was assisted in the presentation by past president Jerry Strong.

She said that Laurie Nimmo, of the high school counseling department, advised that the class of 2010 had been awarded 1.13 million dollars in scholarships and of that amount \$300,000 came from local organization, clubs and businesses.

The five recipients of the Kiwanis Scholarships,\$3,000 each, included Eric Smith, a very active member of the Key Club and son of Kiwanian Andrew Smith, who helped with many Kiwanis Club projects. He plans a career in firefighting and will attend SRJC; Angela Perez plans to attend Brigham Young University where she will major in nursing; Ryan Powers will attend UC Berkeley and plans a career in research medicine; Quaid Mancini, a Kiwanis student of the month, will study engineering and Elizabeth Bucher wishes to study biochemistry and eventually work in the medical field.

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Food Booth at the Country Fair Still A Successful Venture In Spite of 13 Percent Decrease in Profits

Dennis Stead, chairman of the food booth at the annual Future Farmers Country Fair, said that the food booth – featuring hot dogs, Polish dogs, corn dogs and garlic fries – brought in a gross of \$9700, about 13 percent less than last year.

With expenses of about \$2300, the net profit for the three day event will be about \$7400. Dennis also revealed that the big seller was, as usual, corn dogs, with 1,456 sold over the three days. The profits from the booth will become a part of the project fund.

The club members also took part in the Twilight Parade on Thursday. The entry consisted of the members riding colorfully decorated bicycles, Hugo Bauers' restored antique truck plus a new addition of eight Kiwanians riding Segway Two Wheel Human Transporters.
