PROGRAM: Orin Bain presented Frank Crossfield, Ranger in charge of Sonoma County for the California Department of Forestry, who subed for Gil Werder. Ranger Crossfield offered a slide presentation on how the CDF fulfills its responsibility of enforcing the forest and fire laws which encompasses one-third of the state's geography. He closed the program with some mind-boggling costs for one phase of firefighting--the use of aerial tankers, incorrectly called "borate bombers"--borate has not been used for at least 15 years. Instead it is phoscheck, a fertilizer type liquefied. He cited some of the costs; e.g., the S-2 tanker costs \$292/day standby or \$558/hr. in action and the D-6, with a 2000 gallon load at \$600/day standby and \$1100/hr. in action plus the cost of the fire retardant. We better mind Smokey the Bear and BE CAREFUL with fire producing materials!
