About 200 runners registered for the 10k and 3k courses of the 41st annual Fitch Mountain Footrace held on Sunday June 16. The event went off very well thanks to the efforts of event co-chairs Ron and Debi Dobley, event committee members, the many club members needed to monitor each intersection along the racecourse and Boy Scout Troop 21 members who manned the



water stations, all of whom deserve a huge thank you for a job well done. Special thanks to our 28 sponsors shown at right, participating at the \$250 or \$500 level.

The fastest 10K racer was Jason Reed who finished in 35:59. Winner of the 3K was J. R. Mintz at 12:32.

Total revenue banked was about \$18,000 (\$12,000 from sponsorships and about \$6,000 in registrations). Expenses were about \$5,700, leaving net proceeds of over \$12,000 for the benefit of the Healdsburg Kiwanis Memorial Scholarship fund.

The President's Message

It's July and the beginning of the fourth quarter of our four-person co-presidency which began with Loretta Strong, followed by Dick Bugarske, then Jan Gianni and now me, Susan Sheehy. In September I'll be installing our Kiwanis Queen, Terry Kemp as we race toward our 100th anniversary.

Three years ago, with the expertise and connections of then President Randy Collins we launched our first Kiwanis Safety Fair held at the Healdsburg Community Center. I was motivated during my term as president to return to doing activities with kids. It seemed to me that most of our efforts were going to raise money to give to others to help children.

The Safety Fair is a free interactive fair for children and adults held at the Healdsburg Community Center and coincides with Foss Creek Cleanup and Saturday morning soccer games. Last year we had over 500 participants. We created this event by bringing together various agencies that serve our community and asked each to provide hands-on activities focused on safety. We hired the Sonoma County Bicycle Coalition to put on a bicycle skill and safety rodeo for children. Our club purchased bike helmets and distributed them to children in need. The CHP checked and installed child car seats for free. Kids and adults learned hands-only CPR from Save Lives Sonoma and the Healdsburg Fire Dept taught everyone how to operate a fire extinguisher, plus much more. A free taco lunch was provided. Our outreach and marketing were in English and Spanish and reached all our schools with flyers, posters and radio spots.

The cost to put on this event has been about \$7000. Our funding has been primarily supported through grants from various agencies such as ATT, PG&E, Kiwanis Foundation and our club. Our club has supported the Safety Fair with volunteers including our Key clubbers.

Here's the problem. Randy and I were ready to pull the plug on this event for 2019 because we didn't have the funding in place for this year. We need money to do this. So far, our Kiwanis board has committed \$2500. We are applying for another Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Foundation Grant for \$1500 (no guarantee we'll get it). To make this a multi-club project in order to apply for the grant, we've asked Cloverdale Kiwanis to be a sponsor and provide volunteer help. They said yes. Denny Stead has put out a challenge to our club to match up to \$1000 and Vern Losh has put out a challenge to match up to \$1001. Dick Bugarske says we need to roll up our sleeves. Lockie has contacted Comcast to ask for help and Crystal is checking with SoFi. If we get a good response from YOU, we can do this. Remember Kiwanis is for kids. Let's do this!

Board of Directors Meeting

Summarized from minutes by Barbara Erickson

The following is a summary of actions taken and items discussed during the June 2019 Board meeting:

With the establishment of the Healdsburg Kiwanis Foundation, there are now separate Board meeting agenda and minutes for the Foundation and the Administration Management.

Administration Management

 Discussed ways to eliminate the \$12,000 deficit; lunches being the biggest expense, Anita suggested we have one of our weekly meetings at a local restaurant where each person would pay for themselves.

Presentations

- Denny Stead re the food truck: The Board previously approved \$2,500 for repairs to the Food Truck. \$78 was spent on parts; Rick Wood helped with backend, Dennis Furia (local metal person) replaced the backend with metal, not wood. \$100 gift certificates where given to Dan Gianni, Jim Luchesi, Dennis Furia. Denny said there were 3 leaks in the roof which will be fixed before the rains. Bob Santucci suggested a tarp to cover the truck during the winter.
- Denny Stead and Anita Kratka re Brant's Beach BBQ: they suggested returning the event to a social event only for members and guests and eliminate the live and silent auctions. A motion to return Brandt's Beach to a "social" event only was carried.

There was discussion of what the IRS requires for 501C3/501C4 - what can or can't be spent on scholarships. The motion was tabled as more discussion is needed along with more members of the Board to be present.


