#### Summarized from minutes by Liz Bippart

The following is a summary of actions taken and items discussed during the May 2018 Board meeting:

Grants/Donations

• Boy Scout Troop 21 - \$5,300 for a year's rent and registration costs. Troop 21 along with Key Club are our two primary beneficiaries.

#### Money Matters

 Admin Fund: Fund will continue to maintain a low balance, but the promise of funds provided by Brandt's Beach BBQ and the new Hall of Fame event in October should enable the fund to stay afloat without requiring use of the reserved \$10,000.

#### Project Fund:

 Current balances: checking account - \$43,840; Christmas Tree Lot checking - \$8,429; Money Market Fund - \$38,411.

#### President's Report

- Vern will host a meeting of past club presidents and all interested members to discuss the future of our club.
- The following Corporate Resolution was approved: It is resolved: The Kiwanis Club of Healdsburg will use \$10,000 from the Club Reserve Fund for Maintenance of the Club Administrative Fund.

#### Other Business

- Joint Corporate Membership for Lockie Gillie's company, **Wine Country Computers** and Coreen's company, **Lavish** was approved.
- 12 members have yet to pay for their Pancake Breakfast tickets.
- Sponsorships for Fitch Mountain Footrace are increasing over last year.
- The Secretary of State has been paid for our 501c3 application and we are waiting for confirmation from that office. The IRS approval will be the next step.

Comm-University is an intergenerational partnership that brings school children and elders together. Julia and Tony described the development and performance of the program at Healdsburg

Senior Living. Starting partnerships with local schools four years ago, children from 10 schools visit Senior Living to interact with the residents. Each month 700-800 students, pre-school to high school participate.



Students visit with elders in the several Senior Living units - independent living, convalescent care and all stages of dementia. The students and elders:

- Learn from each other
- Establish heartfelt relationships
- Learn Empathy and compassion

Patti Wick has conducted surveys of student participants. By the end of the school year, students:

- Establish meaningful relationships
- Want to continue visiting their "buddies"
- Want to come on their own time
- Have learned that elders are special
- Have practiced empathy and compassion
