# Partnering to Provide Childcare During COVID

City of Healdsburg message

Healdsburg's working families and their school-aged children are getting a lifeline in the form of a subsidized distance learning childcare program for students. The City of Healdsburg's Community Services department is managing the program with support from Corazón Healdsburg and the Healdsburg Unified School



District. Dubbed "Camp HBG 2.0," this program will provide all-day care Monday through Friday and support elementary school students with their distance learning while HUSD schools and all other Sonoma County public schools remain closed for on-campus learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"By bringing together our experience coordinating the traditional afterschool program and the modified Camp HBG program this summer, we'll be able to provide a welcoming and enriching environment for students to complete their distance learning," said Healdsburg Community Services Director Mark Themig.

The program will adhere to guidelines provided by the Sonoma County Health Officer, California Department of Health, and the Centers for Disease Control.

Camp HBG 2.0 is a distance learning care program that will provide students in grades TK-5 the opportunity to complete their virtual learning in a supervised environment. Students will be split into consistent and small groups where they will complete their daily schoolwork as well as take part in enriching recreational activities. The program will be supervised by Community Services Recreation staff.

"Many of our families have come to us worried about caring for their students and helping them succeed academically while also working full time," said HUSD Superintendent Chris Vanden Heuvel. "Camp HBG 2.0 lifts an enormous

burden for our families and underscores our commitment to providing students with equitable access to quality education even during COVID."

This school-year partnership builds on the success of the Healdsburg Community Services summer camps, which provided care for 96 students in June, July and August. The summer and fall programs were made possible by donations from Carson and Kathy Block, Beth Berkson and Rob Das, Healdsburg Kiwanis and many other generous community members.

Healdsburg Community Services has historically been solely funded by Healdsburg's Transient Occupancy Tax, a levy on overnight hotel stays. That revenue dropped off sharply this year with the onset of the pandemic, creating a budget shortfall for the department. In partnership with Corazón Healdsburg, Community Services raised the \$120,000 needed to fund Camp HBG 2.0 for the fall semester from private donors.

Summarized from minutes by Liz Bippart


A special Board of Director's meeting was held by Zoom on August 13 at the request of President Elect Anna Grant to consider funding the second phase of the City of Healdsburg youth camp. The matter was urgent because the funding was due by the start of school on August 14.

A motion was approved to provide \$15,000 for the "Camp Healdsburg 2.0 Distance Learning" program at Healdsburg Community Center. Matching funds up to \$50,000 have been offered so our contribution will be doubled. The program offers day care and schooling for youth of all ages with working parents (full program description on page 1). This is the second round of funding for the camp. Our club also supported the first part.

The regular August Board meeting was canceled due to the wildfire threat, evacuations and evacuation warnings.


We have a new addition to our family, a 10-weekold Golden Doodle named Moses. He is settling in just fine. We are working on crate and potty training this week.

# Our Club connection to the Golden Gate Bridge and the Old Redwood Highway

On opening day, May 27, 1937 – "Pedestrian Day"– some 200,000 bridge walkers marveled at the 4,200-foot-long suspension bridge,



spanning the Golden Gate Strait at the entrance to San Francisco Bay (SF Chronicle). Healdsburg Kiwanian Arnold Santucci at age 17 was one of them.

Joseph Miller was the first President of our Club in 1923-24 and was instrumental in selling the GGB plan along with Frank Doyle, the "Father of the Golden Gate Bridge". Miller also was a leader in the The Builder ----KIWANIS CLUB OF HEALDSBURG

Redwood Empire Association that helped open up the north Coast by expanding Highway 101, the Redwood Highway from the Golden Gate to the Oregon border.

at the Food Pantry. Very happy that the Pantry has been able to maintain its normal distribution schedules to provide free food to needy families.


